A CORRESPONDENT writes to us regarding the destruction of the house and outbuildings of James G. McLeod, by incendiarism. The seat of a prosperous and promising business was reduced to ashes by an act of vandalism—a parallel of which must be looked for in the annals of Bash-Bazouk atrocities."

MYSTERIOUS.—A most extraordinary phenomenon exists in a field on the Mount Edward Road, owned by Hon. John Longworth. The field is heavily sown with grass, and at the upper end is plainly observable a complete and well defined circle, trodden down in the grass, in circumference about one hundred yards, and in width about nine inches. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

NEW YORK, June 21.

The "World's" London despatch says advices from Dublin say that quietness prevails throughout the country. Farmers have harvested the biggest hay crop for fifty years, and the root crops promise to be unprecedentedly abundant. Archbishop McCabe's pastoral of Sunday denouncing the League and sharply reminding the Clergy that their mission is not to incite to war but to promote peace and concord, has thrown the leaguers into confusion. It is known, moreover, that Dr. McCabe is in this, as in many other instances, the direct mouthpiece of the Pope, and the pastoral will have great weight not only in the Archdiocese of Dublin, but throughout Ireland. Many landlords who fled here during the "Boycotting" period are returning home and there are signs on every hand that the agitation has nearly burnt itself out.

The Sportsman says we are informed that the stewards of the Henley regatta have acted most peculiarly in regard to the discussion of the admission of the Cornell University crew. The members who can claim to know anything about rowing have carefully refrained from attending any of the meetings, and the public are coming to the conclusion that they purposely kept away, lest they might be accused of countenancing the discourtesy. Last Friday, when the petition of the Cornell crew to enter for the visitors' cup was under consideration only six stewards attended, of whom two voted in favor of their admission. Lord Camoy, recently elected president of the Henley regatta, whose casting vote alone admitted Cornell to the race for the steward's cup, voted against the admission of the crew for the race for the "Visitor's Cup." The Sportsman continues as follows:—"If rowing members have really held aloof, their conduct is even more contemptible than that of the stewards. The entire matter is a positive disgrace, and we are ashamed that England's notions of fair play should be rendered liable to such aspersions as the Americans may very justifiably indulge in on the affair."

LONDON, June 21. At a meeting of the Land League in Dublin to-day, Sexton, Manager, made a strong appeal to America for funds. He said they had arrived at a critical stage of the struggle of the League and the expenditures were very large.

NEW YORK, June 21. General Grant is preparing a letter in reply to the one he received from President Garfield while in Mexico. He says the President's letter was very courteous and he has neglected to send a reply before. The President's letter was in answer to one General Grant wrote to Senator Jones.

MARSEILLES, June 21. The French and Italians began fighting again to-night. A strong military force started for the scene of the conflict.
