show evidence of having had initials and dates carved on them, but the years have blotted out the distinctive markings. Evidence of some planning and organization in the burials appears from the fact that many of the stones had been lined up in rows.

Unused For Century
The last legible inscription in the cemetery marks the grave of Elizabeth Miller who died on Nov. 18, 1851. It is known that another cemetery was opened up in Covehead shortly afterwards, and a tombstone in it records a burial in 1854. Apparently from the passing of time the old ground became forgotten. It was built alongside a road, and it is believed to have been the first laid out on the island, which has long since become impassable except on foot.

Mr. Thomas Parker, principal of Bloomfield School, Halifax, speaking in Charlottetown, stresses the need for better teaching methods in our schools. It is encouraging to note that the teaching profession, grossly underpaid as it is, is not confining its efforts to raising the remuneration of its members, but is also concerned with raising teaching standards. One falls down without the other. Teachers' salaries will not be materially bettered without accelerated progress in teaching techniques and teacher training, and conversely as long as salaries remain so low, it will be difficult to attract to the profession men and women with the ability to make enlightened teaching methods workable.
