The future takes over this mall, on these soft, dusky nights.

Streams of teen-agers meander the broad walks among saplings, and whisper on benches bordered by beds of flowers. And so, too, do the young capture at night the streets of every Soviet city.

In Leningrad they stroll the Neva. In Kiev, they climb into the forests of the Dnieper. In the Cliffs, in Poltava they march in chains, arm-in-arm, softly singing. In Kharkov they go to Gorki Park.

## Camping Minded Tourists Said Not Easily Diverted

Diverting camping-minded tourists from the National Park campgrounds is not a simple task, National Park Superintendent Eric Kipping said yesterday.

Kipping was referring to a letter in yesterday's paper, written by a New York camper, Bernard Sacks, an editor of Camping Family's "Guide to Campsites."

**FOUND FAULT**  
Mr. Sacks letter found fault with the province's tourist information services, and particularly with the lack of direction and information at the National Park regarding availability of camping space in provincial campgrounds and private campground.

While admitting Mr. Sacks had a "legitimate beef," Mr. Kipping said all attendants at the park are and have been instructed to tell all campers that space is available in provincial and private campgrounds, after the areas at Sandstone and Cavendish have been filled.

"Our attendants have been told time and again to point this out to campers. It appears in this case there has been an island slipup.

"I also informed the travel bureau early last week to inform all campers that our campgrounds here are filled to capacity with long waiting lists. We're overflowing."

**DOESN'T ALWAYS WORK**  
But, Mr. Kipping said, this does not always deter tourists from heading for the National Park, anyway.

He told of the experience of one Island tourist official. He said the official met a group of campers bound for the park. Even after he had informed them the park was filled and that a "lineup of cars a half-mile long waiting to get in," and that about provincial and private grounds were readily available, the campers went to the park, anyway.

"Apparently," Mr. Kipping said, "campers hear from fellow travellers the excellence of the park's campgrounds and simply will not be deterred from seeing them."

Mr. Kipping said every effort will be made to make sure campers will receive full and correct information, and that he will remind park attendants again to refer campers to other camping areas.

## 'Directions Good' Bureau declares

Everything possible is being done to reach the traveller with information on camp grounds, George Fraser, director of the P.E.I. Travel Bureau, said yesterday.

Mr. Fraser was commenting on a letter in yesterday's Guardian, complaining of lack of information on camp sites other than those at the National Park, which were filled to capacity.

He termed the letter "one a isolated complaint," noting that "this is the only one we've heard."

If the writer had stopped at any one of more than a dozen information bureaus from Aulic to Wood Islands, he would have been told to avoid the overflow at the National Park, and go to other grounds as described in the folder "Camp Sites on Prince Edward Island," the travel bureau director insisted.

Every information bureau is notified as soon as a camp ground is filled, he said.

The folder lists and describes 15 provincial parks and 11 private parks from east to west, with room for hundreds of tents, he said. There is no need for anyone to go away.

**PRINTED AVAILABLE**  
Copies in the thousands, these folders are available at every information bureau, and since January had been sent out to everyone who looked for tourist information.

Short of "going out on the road" to find out about the Park Supt. Predicts Record Year

Despite July rain and abnormal cool weather, the Prince Edward Island tourist industry seems headed for another record-breaking season, at least in the National Park area.

Park Superintendent Eric Kipping said yesterday that the number of campers using sites in the park's campground areas doubled this June over June of last year, and at present this campgrounds are overflowing.

He says all park campgrounds are filled to capacity and the flow of traffic is much heavier than last year. The record season pickup started about the middle of last week, with the advent of sunny weather after the Island had experienced the wettest two weeks in its history in nearly July.

He expects the rush to continue.
