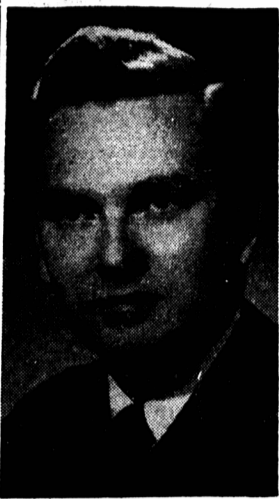

Students and professors, from New York University that forms one side of the Square, sit on the same bench with derelicts from the nearby Bowery. Shabby young (and not so young) writers and artists from their dark little rooms on the side streets, share the same shade tree with the successful in arts and business who live in the expensive apartment buildings that have replaced the modest studios that faced the Square. Children are scolded and praised in Italian and in cultivated English. Elegantly clipped French poodles and just plain dogs exchange comments it would be fun to understand. Only one thing is missing—the organ-grinder and the monkey, who enlivened the scene, years ago. They seemed to belong on Washington Square.
