In accordance with a previous announcement, the British Admiralty have decided to abolish flogging in the navy.

Antarctic Explorers.

A new Antarctic exploring expedition is about to be undertaken, under the command of Sir Allen Young, who will leave England for Cape Town in a yacht this winter to make preparations.

Peace in Kurdistan.

A despatch to the London Standard from Teheran reports that peace has been completely restored in Kurdistan. Sheik Abdullah is ready to submit. The Kurds offer indemnity for the damage done, and will continue to pay taxes.

Basutos Vanquished.

A despatch from Durban to the London Times says:—The neck of the rebellion on his side has been broken and the Pondomese have been entirely routed. The President of the Orange Free State believes that the rebellion will be completely subjugated in six months.

The Panama Canal.

The London Standard's correspondent at Madrid says:—The subscription for Panama Canal stock has been very successful. Thirty-five thousand shares were demanded here in two days, and 15,000 were subscribed for in the provinces. Most Spaniards believe the opening of the Isthmus of Panama will benefit their Colonies in the West Indies. A despatch to the News from Alexandria says there have been very few subscriptions for Panama Canal shares there.

Prosperous Condition of Egyptian Agriculture.

Official statements have been published, showing that the agricultural prosperity of Egypt has never been greater than at the present moment. This is attributed in a large measure to improved irrigation and to the excellence of the cotton crop. The last two Nile have been uniformly favorable to the agricultural development of the country, and more foreign capital is being attracted into it than at any time since the foreign Powers took it under their protection.

The Duty and Drawback on Fish Cans.

The present Customs tariff imposes a duty on cans containing imported fish and under certain restrictions a drawback is payable on materials used in the manufacture of packages or cans containing fish exported. Difficulties have arisen in respect to the identification of canned fish arriving in one Province of the Dominion in transitu through the United States from another Province of the Dominion, and in determining its legal status with regard to the payment of duty or nonpayment of drawback on the cans containing the same. Therefore, to obviate these difficulties and to prevent errors, an Order in Council, dated Nov. 30th, provides that, on the shipment of canned fish the product of one Province of the Dominion to another, through the United States, the shipper thereof shall make at the time, and at the port of shipment, a transitu report of such shipment, which said report shall be made in triplicate, one copy whereof to be retained on file at the post of shipment, the second to be forwarded forthwith by the Collector of Customs at such port to the Collector at the port of destination, and the third to the Customs Department, under cover to the accountant of said Department. Failing the receipt of such a report, fully identifying any canned fish received at this port via the United States, the Collector of Customs shall consider the cans containing such canned fish as subject to duty, and collect the same accordingly. A form of the report is published for the guidance of shippers.

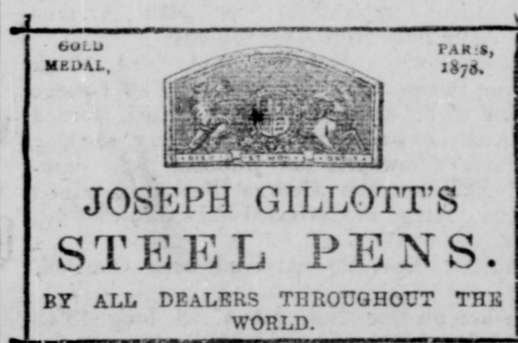
