

## New Annan Herd Production High

W.A. Moose and Son, New Annan had the herd with the highest average production of the breed in the period Nov. 30, 1964, to Nov. 30, 1965, it has been learned from James Williams, Ayrshire Club secretary and fieldman for the province.

The Moose herd have earned this honor on several occasions in the past and have had Canadian class leaders on several occasions. Their Blackadder Amethyst was acclaimed recently as the Canadian leader for the month and her production which is listed below — she was recorded as a junior 2-year-old — may well qualify her for a high spot in the national averages for the year.

The class leaders for this province for the period referred to are as follows — the production in each case is in the 305-day division:

In the senior class for cows 10 years and over R.A. White, Rollo Bay had Sunny Bay Flo produce 10,835 pounds milk, 460 pounds fat for BCAs of 131 and 143 in fat.

In the mature class Cloverview Alberta produced 13,620 pounds milk, 490 fat for BCAs of 161 in milk, 143 in butterfat for an average test of 3.99 per cent for owner W.A. Moose and Son.

In the senior 4-year-old class Mount Pearl Necklace produced 14,890 pounds milk, 614 pounds fat for BCAs of 175 milk, 175 fat, an average test of 4.12 percent, for the director of the Experimental Farm.

**TWIN HILLS DAIRY**

In the junior 4-year old class Twin Hills Dairy produced 13,653 pounds milk, 520 pounds fat for BCAs of 162 milk, 156 fat, average test 3.99 percent for Almon Wood and Son, Little York.

In the senior 3-year-old class Cloverview Snowbird produced 12,314 pounds milk, 472 pounds fat for BCAs of 156 milk, 145 fat, average test 3.83 percent for W.A. Moose and Son.

In the junior 3-year-old class East River Fancy Girl produced 14,178 pounds milk, 585 pounds fat, average test 4.13 percent, for BCAs of 185 in both milk and fat for Almon Wood and Son.

In the senior 2-year-old class Fairvue Burton's Elma produced 10,530 pounds milk, 458 pounds fat, average test 4.35 per cent for BCAs of 145 milk, 182 fat for A. MacRae and Son, Sherwood.

In the junior 2-year-old class Blackadder Amethyst produced 13,632 pounds milk, 544 pounds fat for BCAs of 194 in milk, 166 in butterfat for W.A. Moose and Son. The average test was 3.99 percent.

## Bright Future Is Seen For P.E.I. Farm People

There is a tremendous future for people on island farms, Premier Walter Shaw suggested to a group of 4-H Club leaders — he was speaking particularly to more than two dozen young 4-H Club members — when he spoke last night at the Charlottetown Hotel.

"I foresee the time in the not distant future when every yard of available Prince Edward Island soil will be fully utilized as this province plays its share in the task of feeding a greatly expanded world population," the Premier said with emphasis.

The population of the world was one billion in 1934. It was grown to two billion by 1954, 100 years later; it is three billion today, and reliable estimates suggest it will be between seven and eight billion by the turn of the century, he said.

"You have a wonderful heritage, you who have been born and brought up on Prince Edward Island farms. You have a tremendous responsibility in the future."

In the next quarter of a century, he said, there is going to be an outstanding demand on the people who are on the farms of this country, to feed those billions of people.

There is a tremendous future for the people of the farms of the island Premier predicted.

## Cabinet's Marathon Session Seen 'Interesting' By Shaw

The provincial cabinet had one of its busiest weekly meetings in many years yesterday when several delegations waited on Premier Walter R. Shaw and his ministers.

The premier said last night "it was a long busy day but most interesting."

He said representatives of Bathurst Marine Ltd. and Gulf Garden Foods Ltd. of Georgetown. "We discussed the industrial development in that town," the premier said. "There was nothing of an alarming nature in our discussions but since the government is involved in the development we were brought up to date on its progress."

Representatives of Island Development Company met with the cabinet and Premier Shaw said "the government was given an idea of the company's development plans for the province and I have every confidence that the plans will go through."

A delegation from St. Dunstan's University met with the ministers to renew its request that the government give the university an annual operating grant of \$300,000.

Representatives of Atlantic Area Consultants Ltd. of Fredericton, N.B., outlined to the cabinet plans for potential industrial development that would encompass parts of all Maritime Provinces. "These suggestions need further consideration," the premier said.

## 4 Youths Plead Guilty To Indecent Assault

A charge of rape against four Georgetown youths was withdrawn and another charge of indecent assault on a female was laid by Cst. John Norton, Sherwood Police, before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, who presided over a preliminary hearing in City Court yesterday.

The accused include Lawrence Stewart Burke, 20; Kenneth Gerald Joseph Arsenault, 21; Wilfred John William Prosper (Jr) 18, and Joseph Carl Solomon, 20, who all pleaded guilty to the new charge.

Following addresses by Alan Seales, appearing for the Crown, who reviewed the circumstances giving rise to the case, and John P. Nicholson, for the defence, Mr. Nicholson asked for a suspended sentence for his clients.

Magistrate Johnston then adjourned the case to December 20 at 9.30 a.m. for sentencing.

The case involves a 42-year-old Charlottetown woman who was driven from Charlottetown to a field in Sherwood on the night of Sept. 16 where she was left but who later found her way to a nearby house from where the occupants notified police.

## Outline Need Of College To Provincial Government

A brief outlining the needs of St. Dunstan's University was presented to Premier Walter R. Shaw and his cabinet yesterday by a delegation from the board of governors of St. Dunstan's University headed by Judge C. St. Clair Trainor, chairman of the board.

Other delegates were Rt. Rev. G.A. Macdonald, president of SDU, and board member Dr. J. A. McMillan.

The recommendations of the brief, in summary, were as follows: that St. Dunstan's receive an annual operating grant amounting initially to \$300,000 from the government of P.E.I.; that the government of P.E.I. give immediate consideration to the provision of funds for capital expenditures for higher education in P.E.I.; that the provincial government establish a grants commission as recommended by the Bladen Commission; that the P.E.I. government urge the federal government to give top priority to the implementation of the recommendations of the Bladen Commission and immediate effect to the change in the per capita grant from two dollars to five dollars.

**REQUEST RENEWED**

In renewing SDU's request for a provincial grant of \$300,000, which was first made in 1962, the brief pointed out that: "In the several studies and recommendations already made, one fact has become abundantly evident: A substantial financial commitment by our provincial government is necessary and urgent."

The brief stated that "financial costs have risen significantly and will continue to rise, capital needs are greater than ever, and continuing assistance is needed for operating expenses and capital expenditure."

The SDU budget for 1965-67 showed a considerable deficit, it was stated, and it was emphasized by the delegates that some form of provincial financial assistance must be forthcoming to meet this deficit.

The brief reiterated St. Dunstan's University's stand to work with other groups, by means of coordination and cooperation, "in the best interests of higher education for the people of Prince Edward Island."

**DISCUSSIONS, WITH PWC**

As an illustration of this, and in accordance with the recommendations of the Bonnell Commission, it was pointed out that the SDU board of governors has already sought to initiate discussions with the board of governors of Prince of Wales College "concerning all matters and responsibilities which are of mutual concern."

Assessing SDU's needs in library holdings, it was stated that about 4,500 volumes will be added this year at an approximate cost of \$27,000, but "even at this rate we will not have reached one-third of our available library capacity of 120,000 volumes by the end of the present year."

The brief mentioned that the Bladen Commission recommended a library of between 100,000 and 200,000 volumes to adequately support undergraduate educa-

## Hearing Date Set By Court

**SUMMERSIDE** — Preliminary hearing in the case of Alexander Joseph Bernard, Lennox Island, charged with having sexual intercourse with a female, not his wife, under the age of 18, was set for Thursday when the accused appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Court yesterday.

A resident of Read's Corner, Jean Louis Roy, was found guilty on a charge of failing to drive on the right side of the highway following the testimony of two Crown witnesses George Bernard Chappell and Terrence Chappel, and was fined \$10 and costs, plus fees of \$4 for each witness. The accused who had entered a plea of not guilty at an earlier hearing, was represented by G. Bruce MacDonald.

The charge arose after the two Chappell brothers, occupants of a vehicle which was forced off the highway by the accused's vehicle reported the incident to the RCMP.

A St. Eleanor's man Arthur Edward Campbell entered a plea of guilty on a charge of impaired driving and was sentenced to 10 days in jail from the date of his arrest Dec. 3. With the passing of the sentence the accused having already served his time was released.

Sherman Edward Shaw Mount Pleasant pleaded guilty to a similar charge and was fined \$75 and costs.
