Italy and Austria.

The King of Italy and the Emperor of Austria have been making matters between the two countries as smooth as possible.

The Canadian Cattle Trade.

The annual report of the Minister of Agriculture for the Dominion of Canada for 1880 has just come to hand.

"The cattle trade with Great Britain has, during the past year, assumed larger proportions than in any previous year, and is daily gaining favor in the British markets."
