Telephonic Echoes.

The ice on Souris Bay is staked off for
the races that are expected to take place in
a few days. Betting so far is two to one
in favor of the blacksmith's Strawberry
Queen.

Scarlet fever is quite prevalent in Souris
at present, in consequence of which the
public schools have been closed and the
teachers allowed to go home on a holiday.

The Minister of Marine and Fisheries has,
in compliance with a petition lately sent to
his Department, ordered a report to be
made in regard to the erection of a light
for fishermen on the North Shore.

A great many people are of opinion that
the next King's County Exhibition should
be held in Souris, where a suitable building
for the purpose, the new skating rink, is
now obtainable. The idea is worthy the
serious consideration of the Government.
It may be said that it would be unfair to
the farmers of the western part of the
County to hold the Exhibition so far east.
So it would be if the show were held at
Souris every year. But the better way
would be to hold it in each of the five
electoral districts of the County alternately,
beginning in the First District next year
and moving westward the year after, and
so on until each District in the County has
had its turn.

The roads in the country are in fine con-
dition, and hauling is going on in all di-
rections by farmers getting out their firewood
and longers. The river and sea ice which
is this year over a foot and a half thick,
and glib as glass, and affords excellent op-
portunity for fast horse fanciers to lower
the record.

Washington's Birthday was not forgotten
by the Consular-Agent at Souris, C. C.
Carlton, Esq., who floated the Stars and
Stripes in the breeze on the 22nd in honor
of the "father of his country."

Skating, listening to learned lecturers,
attending debating societies, where subjects
popular and profound are dealt with, form
the principal enjoyments of the present
time among the people of our rural dis-
tricts; and if the cold weather would only
moderate a little, life in the country would
be of the most enjoyable kind.

A hundred carloads of ice are being
shipped daily from Barrie, Ont.

Malignant diphtheria is epidemic at Wel-
lington, Ohio, and the public schools have
been closed.

Le Temps says that if England joins the
laurel conference proposed by the Emperor
of Germany it will be held, but if she re-
fuses it will collapse.

Russia has demanded 3,000,000 roubles
from Bulgaria, being the amount due for
maintenance of troops during occupation
under the Berlin Treaty.

General Benjamin F. Butler has had an
operation performed on the drooping eye-
lid which has disfigured him since his birth
and was growing so troublesome as to in-
terfere with his sight. The operation was
successful.

A clock tower is to be erected at Led-
bury, in Hertfordshire, as a memorial to
Elizabeth Barrett Browning. In her girl-
hood she lived near that town, and some of
her early verse describes the scenery of the
region.

One of the latest fads at fashionable spas
in England is the opening of cafes chantants
by the ladies and gentlemen of the aristo-
cracy. The ladies appear as waitresses,
dressed in French, Swiss and Italian cos-
tumes, and there are great throngs to be
waited on by them. The force of folly
could no further go.

The King of the Belgians wishes his sil-
ver wedding celebrated by devoting to the
poor the money which the municipality
proposes to spend for fetes. But the bur-
gers of Brussels say no; we must have
these festivals in order to bring strangers to
Brussels and make a little money out of
them.

A romance in the life of Tenyson is an-
nounced on the authority of Rev. Charles
Yield, of England, who claims to have
found a verified tribute from the poet,
written in his youth to a young lady named
Bradshaw. The lines of this verse declare
that the writer "longed to kiss the hands
and lie a thousand summers at her feet."

In further confirmation of his theory Mr.
Yield tells this anecdote: One day while
young Mr. Tenyson was out driving with
Miss Bradshaw and other ladies, some one
asked the time. On this Tenyson took
out his watch. Whereupon Miss Bradshaw
leaned over a little, and her worshipper ex-
claimed, "Don't." "Why, am I not to
look?" "No; it would stop to look at
you." This being one of those naively in-
genious replies which lovelick youth de-
light to address to the object of their pas-
sion, the authenticity of the anecdote
ought not to be rashly questioned.

Prof. Schiaparelli, who is best known to
the world from his interesting discover-
ies in regard to the surface and general
condition of Mars, has recently made an
important announcement in regard to mer-
cury. By observation of the spots on its
surface he has found that its period of ro-
tation on its axis is about 88 days, or the
same as its period of revolution around the
sun. It thus always presents the same
side to the sun, and hence, unless mod-
ifying conditions of atmosphere prevail,
of which we can form no conception,
one side of the planet must constantly
be subjected to intolerable heat,
while the other is covered with continuous
night and—unless furnace blasts from the
sunny side pour round into the darkness—
with arctic cold. As watery vapor is re-
vealed by the spectroscopic, it is possible
that a twilight belt around the planet per-
mits of the existence of life, but it is not
improbably a region of tornadoes and
blizzards. Mercury must, therefore, in the
meantime, be excluded from the list of
worlds that may be inhabited, and is not
likely at any time in the ambitious future,
to be covered by the United States.

SCARLET FEVER is very prevalent in Bar-
gor, Me.

WELL FORTIFIED.—The New York Sun
says that Halifax is the most strongly fort-
ified town in the Western Hemisphere.

PERISHED IN THE STORM.—On Friday night
last an elderly school teacher named James
Bell was caught in a snowstorm on his way
from Halifax to Preston, and parties passing
some time after found him dead. He leaves a
wife and ten children.

UNITED STATES JUSTICE.—According to
an exchange, a South Carolina man embez-
zled \$40 and went up for 11 years; an Ohio
man embezzeled \$6,000 and got 5 years; a
Michigan man embezzeled \$25,000 and al-
most got smothered by the congratulations
of his friends. Such is the method of jus-
tice in the glorious land of the free.

CHANGED HANDS.—The Truro Sun says:
David Corbett, of Five Islands, has sold his
handsome colt, Melbourne Chief, sired by
Melbourne King. He was sold for the hand-
somest sun of any horse ever sold in Lower
Colchester, and purchased by Capt. Robert
Corbett of the above mentioned place, who in-
tends sending him to Truro to A. L. Slipp
for a course of professional training.

CANADA'S TRADE.—The exports and im-
ports for the seven months ending 31st Feb.,
1890, make a good showing. The total of ex-
ports for the period named is \$66,485,620, as
against \$57,412,899 for the corresponding
period of last year, an increase of \$9,072,721.
The total of imports for the same period is
\$65,539,433, compared with \$59,114,467 for
the seven months of the previous year, an in-
crease of \$6,424,966. The duties show a
corresponding increase of \$380,708.

A WONDER OF THE AGE.—The Truro Sun
says: A few miles from Tatamagouche there
is a child which, at its birth, a few months
ago, had a father and mother, two grand-
fathers and two grand-mothers, three great-
grandfathers and three great-grandmothers,
one great-great-grandfather and one great-
great-grandmother—these two last being hus-
band and wife—all living. A few weeks ago
one of the great-grandmothers died. The
others are all well and living within a few
miles of one another.

LOVE OF COUNTRY.—His Grace Archbishop
O'Brien is a firm believer in the Dominion—
"the highest gem in the British crown."
Having been elected one of the vice-presidents
of the Imperial Federation League of Canada,
he says: "If we only could succeed in mak-
ing all Canadians have confidence in the fu-
ture of Canada, in its vast and varied re-
sources, and its almost unlimited possibilities,
our work would be easier. We must only
hope that love of country will wax stronger
with our growth in material prosperity;
and every race will realize that the develop-
ment and strength of each are best secured by
moderation in their peculiar views and justice
in their actions."
