The Lobster Matter Again.

The regulation published yesterday has not been changed so far as it has reference to lobsters with spawns in them and young lobsters.

In the Province of Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and that part of the Province of New Brunswick, comprising the counties of Charlotte, St. John and Albert, no person shall fish for, or catch, kill, buy, sell or possess any lobsters from the 1st to the 31st of August in each year.

The law, then, is at present that lobsters with spawns in them, and lobsters under nine inches in length, shall not be caught or possessed at any time, and no lobsters of any kind whatever shall be caught during the month of August.

Customs Duties.

We learn that the receipts for Customs duties at Charlottetown and Summerside, for the first three weeks in May, 1880 were \$29,110.32; and for the same period this year, 1881, the receipts were \$53,427.33, showing an increase of \$24,317.01.

Dominion Exhibition.

A meeting of the Advisory Board, appointed by the Government to secure a representation of this Province at the Dominion Exhibition, to be held at Halifax, N. S., during the last week of September next, was held yesterday at the Legislative Library.

Senator Haythorne, on being called to the chair, alluded in complimentary terms to the distinguished and laudable services rendered by the Hon. Mr. Justice Hensley to the agricultural and industrial interests of this Province, during the many years he acted in the capacity of Chairman of Boards of Provincial Exhibitions, as well as President of previous Advisory Boards, appointed by Government for purposes similar to those for which the present Board is convened.

In the absence of Judge Hensley, now on a visit to England, Senator Haythorne assured the Board that nothing would be wanting on his part to secure for the Province the best possible representation of her products and manufactures at the Dominion Exhibition of 1881.

The Secretary then informed the Board that he had already written to W. McKerron, Esq., of Halifax, Secretary of the Dominion Exhibition, and received the following reply:—

HALIFAX, N. S., May 25, 1881. A. McNeill, Esq. DEAR SIR,—Your letter of the 23rd inst. duly to hand, conveying the gratifying news of the action of your Government respecting the Dominion Exhibition.

Our General Committee meets on Friday next, when I shall have pleasure in laying your letter before them. I request to say that the Prize List is still in the printer's hands, but we expect it will be ready by the end of the week, when I shall wait on you with a supply.

The Honorary Directors for your Province are Hon. J. C. Pepe, Minister of Marine, &c., James Yeo, M. P., Hon. W. W. Sullivan, Q. C., and Henry Longworth, Esq.

The indications so far are very gratifying; in fact I may say the success of the Exhibition is assured.

Yours truly, W. McKerron, Secretary Dominion Exhibition.

It was then agreed upon that at the time Mr. McKerron's visit to this Province, a meeting of the Board be convened, and that he be invited to attend said meeting.

The following committees were then appointed: On Manufactured Goods—D. McKinnon, J. Newton, Hon. P. Gavin, Albertson, and Arch. J. McDonald, Esq., Georgetown.

On Stock, Cereals and Vegetables—C. C. Gardiner, H. Longworth, Alex. Laird, and J. C. Underhay, Esquires.

On Fish—Hon. P. Gavin, Hon. N. McLeod, and Arch. J. McDonald, Esquires.

The Board will appoint competent judges for the inspection of all exhibits for the Dominion Exhibition in due time. And all such exhibits as will be approved of, will be forwarded to and from Halifax, free of charge to exhibitors.

After deliberating upon the necessity of urging upon all engaged in Agricultural and Industrial pursuits, the very great necessity for special attention to the culture and manufacture of such products as they contemplate forwarding to the Dominion Exhibition, the meeting adjourned.

The Thamos Horror.

LONDON FILLED WITH INTENSE GLOOM—SEVEN HUNDRED PERSONS ON BOARD THE SUNKEN STEAMER—THE FURIALS OF THE VICTIMS.

(Condensed from late papers.)

LONDON, Ont., May 26.—The intense gloom of the community here to-day is only relieved by the brightness of the sun. From an early hour the bells have been tolling and funeral processions winding through every street on their way to the cemeteries. All business places have been closed up and the city wears the aspect of the Sabbath with a mighty solemnity pervading the atmosphere.

WANDERING ABOUT THE STREET in a dazed way murmuring to himself: "My poor little girl—my poor little girl." It has been decided to erect a memorial in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.
