

Huge Crowds Attend Races Yesterday

Babe Britton Straight Heat Winner In 2:18 Pace At Afternoon Racing Meet

Babe Britton, owned by George Thompson, Summerside, and teamed this year by Len O'Meara, one of the best pacers in the Maritime, could not be beaten during the Old Home Week racing yesterday as she literally ran away from her opposition when the need arose. She was racing in the First Division of the 2:18 Pace.

Some of the best pacers in her class were the Maritime opponents she had to face, but the Island-owned champion stayed where she wanted to be through the half and down to the three-quarters and then pulled out in the stretch and dropped her field as she went on to win three straight heats. She did not lower her record, but that was probably because Mr. O'Meara thought it was not necessary and she did pace the two fastest miles of the afternoon as she twice went the distance in 2:09.

In the first heat she was challenged by the top horses but came home in front with not too much difficulty. In the second she took the lead at the start and although Shining Hour tried desperately to move up on the outside she held it. A. G. Scott, the Nova Scotia-owned pacer, tried on the top turn but O'Meara, top driver here this season, as he was last year, always had something left in reserve. In the third heat she practically every horse in the race got into the act as they all tried to beat out the Babe. Abieland, Shamrock Thoughts, Johnnie Kalmuck all engaged in a wild stretch drive, but when the excitement was ended it was Babe Britton in

front again.

The afternoon's fun was opened with the first heat of the Third Division of the 2:25 pace when Sea Plant, owned by Ray Stewart, Murray Harbor, headed a field of Island pacers by taking two wins before she dropped down to fifth place in the final go.

The second event of the afternoon was the Second Division of the 2:25 Pace with seven starters when Miss Judy Hal, reined by Worrrell Lewis, Cape Breton, held her stretch lead under terrific drives by Buddy O'Conner and Lassic Lucille, teamed in the old time style by Lieut.-Col. D. A. (Dan) MacKinnon. However, the Island-owned mare, Ruby Dale, owned by Walter Simmons, Kensington, and driven by George Sobey, walked off with the second go only to see the Nova Scotia-owned mare come through in the third heat after one of the bitterest stretch drives with Lassic Lucille.

Montreal Man Wins Queen's Gold Medal At Annual DCRA Shoot

SOUTH MARCH, Ont. (CP)—A Montreal marksman Wednesday captured the Queen's Gold Medal in a match at the 85th annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association shoot.

Lieut. Arthur McKeage of the Canadian Grenadier Guards posted the highest score in the field of some 400 sharpshooters taking part in the match one of the featured events of the week-long shoot on these ranges near Ottawa.

He carried a score of 176 of a possible 200 in the match which is fired in four stages. Three others tied with 175. They were Cpl. Gerald Ouellette of Windsor, Ont., Sgt. J. W. Lightburn, Mission City, B.C., and Ptl. Sgt. J. V. Martin of Camp Berdon, Ont.

A total of 40 rounds are fired in the match, which is open to members of the armed forces. The marksmen fire 10 rounds deliberate from 600 yards, 10 rounds of firing with movement at 600 to 100 yards, 10 rounds of rapid firing at 300 yards and 10 rounds snap shooting from 300 yards.

The match was won last year by Lt.-Col. Steve Johnson of Calgary, author of "Shoot to Live," a manual now used in the Canadian Army.

Three tie shoots were shot off to decide the winners in the City of Ottawa Cunnought and Bankers matches.

Maj. A. P. Williams posted 24 of a possible 25 in the regulation five-round shoot-off of the City of Ottawa match to break the tie with CSM. Norm L. Beckett of Hamilton, who carded 18 from the 900 yard range.

In the match proper, four other marksmen posted 98s, two off the possible. They were: Sqdn. Ldr. Dave Reynolds, Ottawa; L. Bdr. C. R. E. Halnan, a member of Britain's Cambridge University team; Frank C. Sullivan, New Westminster, B. C. and Officer Cadet E. L. Warner, Lennoxville, Que.

Helicopter Winner Of Hambletonian Stakes

GOSHEN, N. Y. (AP)—Helicopter, a fleet Canadian-owned filly won the richest of all Hambletonian stakes Wednesday when she captured the last two heats of the \$17,117.98 trotting derby at Goshen Time Park before a screaming crowd of some 20,000 persons.

It was the first time a foreign-owned horse had won the world-famous race for 3-year-old trotters since it was inaugurated in 1926.

The proud owners are two Brampton, Ont., brothers, J. Elgin and C. E. Armstrong, road builders.

The sleek brown daughter of Hoot Mon, himself winner of this colorful sulky classic in 1947, was driven by 23-year-old Harry Harvey, who became the youngest driver ever to capture the race.

It also marked the first time that a Hambletonian winner had sired another winner of the great Goshen race, made famous by 79-year-old Bill Cane, Mr. Trotting.

Freddie Scott Turns In Fastest Time Of Night In 2nd Division Of 2:18 Pace

The fastest time of the night last evening was recorded by Freddie Scott, a chestnut gelding, when he rode Single Streak at the three-quarter pole to take complete command of the first heat of the Second Division of the 2:18 Pace and win going away in the good time of 2:10 1-5. He repeated the performance in both the second and third heats.

Whirlaway, owned and driven by L. J. O'Brien left not a doubt regarding his ability in the first event of the night, a classified race, when he took both dashes with little difficulty.

The third night of the Old Home Week racing program brought out another great crowd of fans who once again were rewarded with a whole supply of driving finishes and typically-Island close endings calling for photos by the judge to decide the placements.

A big surprise of the evening was the opening win by Henry Day in the first heat of the Third Division of the 2:20 Pace. It made a nice payoff for the trusting fans who bet on him as they collected \$40.90 for each win ticket. After the initial heat Sandy Budlong took over and won the last two in convincing style.

Major Upset Yesterday At Maritime Golf Meet

SAINTE JOHN, N. B. (CP)—Sorely-thatched P. C. (Pete) Kelly of Fredericton who for many years has been coveting around Maritime golf courses as though they were his personal playgrounds, saw his chances for a fourth Maritime amateur crown go up in smoke from scorching play by lean Johnny Randles of Riverside, as the three-province tournament produced its first major upset.

Kelly, who counts his N. B.-P.E.I. titles in fours, who has been a member of Willington Cup inter-provincial teams eight times and who has played for Canada in America Cup matches, was convincingly beaten by the Riverside shotmaker, 3 and 2, in the second round of the championship division.

The match between Kelly and Randles, one of eight in the round, was given little heed when the pair teed off. Although not exactly a foregone conclusion, it was assumed Kelly would win and the lower bracket of the division was shaping up as a battle between the Fredericton golfer and Roy Morrison of Moncton.
