FIRE.—An alarm of fire was rung in to central about three o'clock this morning for a blaze in the cannery factory of Mr. L. H. McLean on Grafton St. The building was formerly used as the rooms of the Rollo Fire Engine Co., but about two weeks ago Mr. McLean took it and transformed it into a factory for canning different kinds of meats. The fire occurred in the back part of the building but from what cause is not known. The fire burned fiercely for some time but subsided before the main part of the building had been materially injured. Mr. McLean had a large quantity of mutton on hand, canned and in carcass, nearly all of which is destroyed. Men are hard at work cleaning up the debris to-day, and Mr. McLean, who has a large quantity of meat waiting him in the country, hopes to be able to resume business the first of next week. He estimates his loss at over \$1,000 with no insurance.

OTTAWA NOTES

The Newfoundland Conference.

THE ST. MARIE CANAL

Ottawa, Oct. 5.

The Premier returned to Ottawa to-night.

It is understood that Hon. Messrs. Bowell, Tupper and Chapleau have been selected as representatives of the Canadian Government at the proposed conference with delegates from Newfoundland, which will be held at Halifax this month. Mr. Stewart, of the Department of Justice, will probably act as Secretary of the Conference.

Chief Justice Lacoste, ex-speaker of the senate, has been appointed a Privy Councillor.

Mr. Ryan, contractor for the Sault Ste. Marie Canal, is in the city and states that the canals will be completed in time for the opening of navigation in 1894.

The Supreme Court opened to-day, Judge Strong presiding.

Columbus Celebration.

Quebec, Oct. 5.

The four hundredth anniversary of the discovery of America will be celebrated here on the 12th inst. with eclat. A grand musical soiree will be held in the Basilica, His Eminence Cardinal Taschereau officiating. During the Mass, 200 guns will be fired from DuRoi terrace by a detachment of artillery, and in the evening a literary and musical soiree will be given under the auspices of the Institute Canadien.

Cholera in Havre.

Havre, Oct. 5.

Three new cases of cholera and five deaths were reported here yesterday.

The Plague in Pesth.

Vienna, Oct. 5.

The number of fresh cases of cholera in Pesth to-day was 34 and the number of deaths 18.

Lord Tennyson's Condition.

London, Oct. 4.

A telegram from H. Salomons at 11 p. m., says Lord Tennyson is quite prostrated and it is not likely he will survive the night.

General Telegraphic News.

St. Stephen, Oct. 3.—The trotting horse Black Jack, recently purchased by Harry McLean, of St. John, from C. H. Eaton, of Milltown, was seized by Customs Officer Bixby when he was being put on board the steamer for St. John this morning. Mr. Eaton purchased the horse when he was residing in Lexington, Mass., and when he returned to Milltown in January, 1891, brought him in free of duty as settler's effects. The law provides that horses so brought into Canada cannot be sold under two years from date of entry, and it was for violation of this provision that the seizure was made. Mr. Eaton is now visiting Boston. Collector Graham has placed the horse in charge of Jas. Eagan, who has handled him since the recent sale.

President J. G. Schurman, of Cornell, has been taking his share in the discussion of the problems of labor and capital. The following quotation, which we find in the Messenger and Visitor, shows that the clever Islander can preach as well as teach:

"Great manufacturing enterprises give rise by their very association to moral rights and duties, which they are under obligation to observe even though the statutes of the state take no cognizance of them. Property must be moralized, labor must be moralized, if the industrial ills of our time are to cease. Still, for many a day we are likely to have strikes with us, and I venture to lay down two rules for the guidance of the strikers. The first is a precept of prudence: Never strike unless you are sure of success. The other is a law as inviolable as the oracles of God: In your strikes be tenacious of justice, tender of property and reverent of human life. Otherwise discontent is sure to fall upon the workman, and, in the long run, disaster upon society."
