(Continued from page 1) In Madrid, the Spanish capital's churches were jammed to capacity while thousands of volunteers were engaged in the religious activities.

Londoners flocked to their houses of worship bundled up against the coldest Easter since 1953. The temperature was 43 degrees and there was no sunshine.

In Jerusalem, Jordan, some 10,000 pilgrims and tourists took part in services in Bethlehem, Jordan, and Jerusalem as church bells pealed out the message of Easter.

CARDINAL CONFIRMED But the man who presided led these rituals, says Cardinal Mindszenty, celebrated his eighth Easter Sunday—and his 72nd birthday—behind the doors of the U.S. Legation. The Roman Catholic prelate has been in American asylum since the 1956 revolution which freed him from a Communist jail.

At Frankfurt, West Germany, an estimated 24,000 persons took part in ban-the-bomb marches. Prominent demonstrators included Pastor Martin Niemöller, the anti-Nazi protest church leader, and Rolf Hochhuth, author of the controversial play The Deputy.

In Moscow, it was just another Sunday for most Russians—since the Russian Orthodox Easter comes May 3. Thousands strolled the Soviet capital's slushy streets to do their usual Sunday shopping.

Gilderson suffered a broken wrist and possible neck fracture. The extent of Williger's injuries was not known.
