CAPE COLONY

INVADED BY TWO BANDS OF BOERS

Who are being Gradually Driven Back.

LONDON, Dec. 19.—The Boers have invaded Cape Colony at two separate points one hundred miles distant, says the Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Mail. One commando advanced upon Philipstown, between Colesburg and Kimberley. The other is supposed to be at Ver-sogs. A commando crossed the Orange River between Odendaal and Bethulie, northwest of Burghersdorp. Its objective is apparently being Cradock.

General McDonald is engaging the invaders, who have no guns, twenty miles west of Burghersdorp.

The latest news is that they are being slowly forced back to Orange River, where a warm reception is being prepared for them.

FIRES IN BOSTON.

\$200,000 Lost in Smoke Last Night.

BOSTON, Dec. 19.—Eight fire alarms following close on each other necessitated by three fires in different sections of the city kept nearly the entire fire department on the move last night, between eight o'clock and midnight, and the total of the night's fire losses will aggregate well on towards \$200,000.

The first alarm was for a blaze in Charlestown, where a trunk and bag factory cutter was burned, loss \$40,000. A section in the basement of the six story Wakefield building, near North Union Station, was burned at a loss that will probably reach \$150,000.

The third alarm was for a blaze at Roxbury.

LORD ROBERTS' RETURN.

New Programme—Thanksgiving Abandoned.

LONDON, Dec. 19.—The contemplated thanksgiving service in St. Paul's Cathedral in connection with the return of Lord Roberts from South Africa has been abandoned, the Government announcing that it has been considered desirable to defer the general thanksgiving until the close of the operations in South Africa.

The programme is, now, for Lord Roberts to debark in the Solent, to visit the Queen at Osborne House, Jan. 2nd, to re-embark and to land finally at Southampton, coming from that point to London.

OBITUARY.

At Tracadie Head, on Dec. 12th, Mary Campbell, relict of the late Angus McAulay, aged 82 years. Deceased was a kind, charitable and obliging neighbor, and won the esteem, love and respect of all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance. Twenty-eight years ago it was the will of the great Creator to afflict her family. She saw her husband, one son and four daughters taken from her by typhoid fever. She leaves to mourn her departure three sons and three daughters, Angus C McAulay with whom she always lived, Alexander McAulay, of Johnston's River, and James McAulay, of P. E. I. Railway department, Mrs. Patrick Reid, of Hope River, Mrs. William Bowlan, of same place, and Mrs. Jas. A. Smith, of Charlottetown. Her remains were interred in the quiet cemetery at St. Bonaventure's Church, Tracadie, where a solemn Requiem High Mass and burial service was rendered by the parish priest, Rev. Father McGuigan.

UNITED IN DEATH.

Tragic End of Famous French Playwright and His Wife.

PARIS, Dec. 18.—Literary and social circles were greatly shocked at the announcement of the simultaneous death of M. Edmond Tarbe des Sablons, the well-known man of letters, and playwright, and part founder of the 'Gaulois,' and his wife, which occurred yesterday in unusually dramatic circumstances. A servant, on entering their bedroom in the morning, according to regular custom, found M. Tarbe supporting his wife's head in one hand, while with the other he held a basin into which she was vomiting blood. The servant withdrew at a sign from M. Tarbe that her services were not required. An hour later groans issued from the room. A relative entered and found the lady dead in bed. M. Tarbe, seated in an arm-chair, was still holding the basin in his clenched fist. His eyes were closed, and he was moaning piteously, but was quite unconscious. In spite of incessant efforts to restore animation, he died at noon. The doctors certify that death was due to natural causes in both cases. The lady suffered from heart disease, and her husband died of apoplexy.

Close of the Century.

MONTREAL, Dec. 18.—To mark the outgoing century and the incoming of the 20th, the various religious denominations in Montreal have arranged for a series of services. Solemn midnight mass will be celebrated in all the Roman Catholic churches on the evening of December 31, 1900, commencing at 11 o'clock and continuing until half-past one o'clock on the morning of January 1st, 1901. The Arch-bishop of Montreal will officiate pontifically at the cathedral. The services will be marked by the singing of the Te Deum and the rendition of the musical programmes. In the Church of England, the Lord Bishop of Montreal has ordered that special services be held at midnight on December 31 in the cathedral and leading churches. In nearly all the Protestant churches the first Sunday of the new century will be marked by special and appropriate services and sermons.
