P. E. I. SUBWAY.—The subway between Cape Tormentine and P. E. Island will probably be a success. In conversation with His Grace, Archbishop O'Brien, we learned that he predicted, some fifteen years since, its completion during the present century; now His Grace believes that five years will see the work completed, and bases his belief upon the facts that (1) the bedrock is really good; (2) there is a company ready to build for a subsidy equal to the loss on the P. E. Island Railway and cost of mail transport; (3) P. E. Island must have justice. His Grace hopes to be one of the first passengers, and will take the trip in 1890.—Anherst Gazette.

On Saturday evening last, at about 5.30 o'clock, while Mr. Edward Love was standing in his front door on Pleasant Street, he was startled by the discharge of a gun, or rifle, which sent a bullet whizzing past him. The gun was discharged on the east side of the Railway track, which is 400 or 500 yards from Mr. Love's house. The bullet first struck the window sill, the slant of which gave it an upward direction. It next struck the window sash and both are deeply cut. From the marks left it is the opinion that the missile was an old rifle bullet fired from a gun. Mrs. Love was sitting inside of the window at the time, and her escape was most providential. Several children were tilting on the fence immediately in front, over whose heads the bullet must have passed. Such reckless handling of guns demands that our police shall in future confiscate all firearms in the hands of youths in and about our city. Prevention is better than punishment, and we hope that our civic authorities will take hold of this gun nuisance at once.

In a recent sermon on the iniquities of the rum traffic Dr. Talmage says: "I indite this evil as the fratricide, the patricide, the matricide, the uxoricide, the regicide of the century. Only once in a while is there anything in the title of liquors to even hint their atrociousness. It is an honest name, and every one can understand it. Sour mash! That is, it makes a man's disposition sour, and his associations sour, and his prospects sour, and then it is good to mash his body, and mash his soul, and mash his business, and mash his family. Sour mash! One honest name at last for an intoxicant! But through lying labels of many of the apothecaries' shops good people who are only a little undertone, have unwittingly got on their tongues the fangs of this cobra, that stings to death a large ratio of the human race."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

News from Halifax. HALIFAX, Oct. 10. The Imperial troopship Himalaya arrived this morning. She brought Admiral Lyons and fourteen hundred troops and blue jackets for service in Canada and Bermuda. She takes the Royal Irish Rifles from Halifax to Egypt.

The Dominion Government steamer Alert returned from Hudson Bay this afternoon. She brought home all the officials stationed there for the last two years.

General Booth and staff are here, and there is great activity in Salvation Army circles. Booth was met by the Mayor of the city. He is the guest of Dr. Oliver, Sir A. T. Galt's son-in-law.

The Fishery Question. LEWISTON, Me., Oct. 10. Senator Frye, Chairman of the Senate Committee, investigating the question today, said that "the general tenor of the testimony given before the committee was to the effect that owners and fishermen agree that there is no necessity for our vessels entering Canadian ports for bait, and also that there is no need of fishing within the three-mile limit." Frye regards the making of a Reciprocity Treaty as an impossibility.

"The Wicked Fleeth." NEW YORK, Oct. 10. It is reported that Jaehne, the convicted Alderman now serving a sentence of ten years for bribery, will turn State's evidence. In anticipation of such betrayal, at least two of the suspected Aldermen have fled for parts unknown.

The Green-Eyed Monster. ST. LOUIS, Oct. 10. This evening at the Alhambra theatre, Josie Martelle, a rather pretty specialty woman, was stabbed and instantly killed by Frank Handmeyer, who immediately ended his own existence. The cause was jealousy.

Troubles in the East. SOFIA, Oct. 10. To-day 150 peasants came in from the surrounding villages, and after visiting the Russian Consulate tried to put a stop to the elections. An affray ensued, in which several persons were wounded.

Funds Wanted. DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 10. President Fitzgerald, of the Irish National League, has written a letter asking for funds to assist evicted tenants in Ireland, and has headed the subscription with a donation of \$3,000.

An Absconder. CHICAGO, Oct. 10. Need, a partner in the packing house of J. C. Ferguson & Co., of this city, has absconded to Canada with \$400,000 of the firm's money. The firm is entirely ruined by Need's rascality.

Relief of Charleston. CHARLESTON, S. C., Oct. 10. From Sept. 7th to Oct. 9th, 217,542 rations have been distributed by the earthquake relief committee, at a cost of \$1,483,938. There has been no shock since yesterday morning.

Missing Steamer Found. ST. JOHN'S Nfld., Oct. 10. The missing steamer Anchoria, with her main shaft broken, lies under canvas about 70 miles off Cape Spear. Passengers and crew all well.

Great Fire. PITTSBURG, Pa., Oct. 10. A large portion of the town of Punxsutawney was destroyed by fire yesterday, causing a loss of \$165,000.
