

# Dodgers Move To Within One Game Of First Place

Brooklyn Dodgers moved within a game of first place Monday night as they defeated the Chicago Cubs 11-4. Mantle went four games up on Babe Ruth's 1927 home run pace as he hit No. 46 to furnish the high spots in the major league games played Wednesday afternoon.

With Roy Campanella slugging across five runs, three on his 16th homer, the Dodgers defeated the Chicago Cubs 11-4. Campanella doubled across two runs in the Brooks' five-run first inning which hung the defeat on rookie Don Kaiser, first of four Chicago hurlers.

In the fifth with the Dodgers leading 5-2 on and two out, the Brooklyn catcher settled the issue with his homer. The blow came off former teammate Jim Hughes.

Duke Snider bolstered his National League home run lead by hitting No. 37 in the seventh for the Dodgers. Two of the 11 Chicago hits off Don Erskine were Don Hoak's three-run homer and Gene Baker's solo blast out of the field.

Mantle almost became a goat in the Yankees 7-6 decision over the Kansas City Athletics. He muffed a fly ball with the bases full in the first inning which went for a two-base error and cleared the bases to send the As off to a 4-0 lead before they even got a hit. But he clouted his 46th homer in the third inning and in the ninth with two out and the scored. Mickey singled Gil McDougald home with the winning run. Joe Collins also homered for the Yankees in their 3-run ninth.

**BOTH SOX WIN**  
Chicago White Sox and Boston Red Sox, battling for third place in the American League, also came through with victories in the only other day games.

The White Sox defeated Washington, 9-7, despite a six-run rally by the Senators in the ninth. The Red Sox downed Detroit, 4-2, with Dick Gernert batting in three runs and Ike Delock shutting off a late Tiger threat to preserve Tom Brewer's 17th victory.

Jim Wilson, who had lost eight straight, had a three-hitter going into the last inning. Then the Senators rallied for six hits and had the potential tying run at the plate when Ellis Kinder put down the uprising.

Nelle Fox, Minnie Minoso and Walt Dropo led the White Sox's 14-hit attack. Fox got four and Minoso and Dropo three each.

Scheduled for night games in the National League were the Braves and Pittsburgh Pirates, New York at Cincinnati and Philadelphia at St. Louis. The lone American League night contest sent the Indians against the Orioles at Baltimore.

**CINCINNATI (AP)**—The little men in Cincinnati's lineup did the damage Wednesday night as Roy McMillan and Johnny Temple drove in decisive runs to give the Reds a 4-3 victory over the New York Giants. The victory gave the Reds a sweep of the two-game series with New York and kept them in hot pursuit of Milwaukee and Brooklyn for the National League lead.

McMillan and Temple got a lot of help from some tight relief pitching by Art Fowler, who relieved starter Johnny Klippstein in the fourth.

McMillan drove in two runs in the second and Temple drove in what proved to be the decisive tally in the fourth.

**ST. LOUIS (AP)**—Philadelphia ace Robin Roberts survived a

shaky start Wednesday night to get an 8-6 victory over St. Louis as the Phillies, led by Del Ennis, battered four Cardinal pitchers for 7 1/2 hours.

Roberts was tagged for 12 hits, including four doubles and a homer, but held on to even his season record at 15-13. He put down a ninth-inning Cardinal uprising which saw the Redbirds score once on Don Blasingame's single, an infield out and Stan Musial's single.

Roberts trailed 4-0 after two innings but bore down after the Phillies got him a lead.

Ennis batted in three runs with a homer, double and sacrifice fly. EX - Cardinal Solly Hemus had three singles.

Catcher Ray Katt blasted a home run and two doubles, driving in three St. Louis runs.

**BALTIMORE (AP)**—The Cleveland Indians squeaked by with a 3-2 victory over the Baltimore Orioles Wednesday night when Vic Wertz drove in the winning run with a sacrifice fly in the eighth inning.

Starting Oriole pitcher Mike Fornieles was coasting along on three scattered hits until the sixth, when the Indians pushed across two runs.

Cleveland had a strong threat going in the eighth but managed to put out only one run across. After Bobby Avila had singled, Bill Wight replaced Fornieles for Baltimore and pinch hitter Jim Busby singled, sending Avila to second. Both advanced on a double steal. Colavito was walked and Wertz drove in his second run of the night with his 400-foot sacrifice fly.

Fornieles was charged with his seventh loss compared to three wins. Indian starter Mike Garcia failed to even his record, which stands at 10-11, and the victory went to Don Mossi, his sixth in 10 decisions.

### More Ballgames Needed Like Tuesday's Thriller

More baseball games in the same vein as the one the Dodgers and Flyers played Tuesday night would bring baseball back to its former stature as a major sport in Charlottetown in less time than it takes Jackie Robinson to steal second base. In the opinion of this witness it was by far the best game of the year not only because it was a thriller right down to the wire but for about the first time this year the players themselves showed a tremendous spirit. We don't mean to imply that fighting spirit was absent from all other contests but it most certainly was never before so much in evidence as it was last night.

We need more games like this to woo the fans back from other distractions. There were a little more than the usual group in the stands for Tuesday's game and even though they shivered through cool, damp weather for nine innings everyone we talked to was well satisfied that their money had been well spent. Maybe they credited the goosepimples to the excitement of the game, and did not notice that we have been beset with anything but ideal baseball weather. We would venture a surmise that even a bigger crowd will be in attendance tonight.

It is unfortunate that the playoffs have to be a short best-of-three series. But the rush is on and with the coming intermediate and junior playoffs and the curtailed playing time there just wasn't any other solution. Monday night's track and field meet will see the last of the lights at Memorial Field this year. With the end of August they will have been in operation for two months and even in that short period the Abwegweit Club is in the red because of it. We should be thankful we had them as long as we did for without them the league would have been a sorry mess. Five and six inning games are never popular with fans who pay to see nine.

The City finals will be finished Friday night if the Flyers should win tonight's contest and on Saturday we swing into the island finals as the Intermediate Abbies head for Summerside for the first game scheduled to start at 2:30. The series will be the best-of-five and the second game will be at Charlottetown Sunday.

The Abbies should be the favorites to take home the title but if present Summerside teams are anything like they used to be this won't mean a thing. Summerside is operating at a big disadvantage with no lights and no games on Sundays for as a result they have quite likely played considerably less baseball this year than have the Abbies, whose players have been getting at least two and sometimes three games a week all season long. This may seem like only a small advantage to the Abbies to some but baseball players will tell you that, up to a point, the more games you play during the year the better you will be in playoffs.

Charlottetown has another up and coming young ball player, who may in a year or so provide local fans with a lot to cheer about. He is young Harry Callaghan who played his second game with the Dodgers Tuesday and handled himself around first base with an assurance you couldn't expect in a youngster. Harry is a little on the short side for first baseman but then he is only 15 years old and can be expected to grow a good bit in the next few years. Harry didn't get any hits but we think this was due to the weight of the bats the kid had to use rather than to any lack of hitting ability. The teams were playing with only three bats between them and all three were more suitable for a fellow like Buck Whitlock rather than a youngster like Harry. We hear a few more were supposed to have been bought yesterday. We hope they picked a few light ones.

## Chills, Fever Send Boudreau To Hospital

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Manager Lou Boudreau of Kansas City Athletics was taken to a hospital early Wednesday suffering from high fever and chills and is expected to remain for two or three days.

Dr. Sidney Gaylor, New York Yankees' physician, ordered the "no visitors" sign out at Lenox Hill Hospital because Boudreau had not slept all night.

"He was brought to the hospital at 5:45 a.m., and naturally I said he was to have no visitors, at least until after Wednesday's game with the Yankees. I wanted him to get some sleep, but he's probably sitting up watching the game now over television."

The hospital confirmed this, saying arrangements had been made to put a TV set in his room.

Dr. Gaylor attributed the illness to after effects from the extraction of a wisdom tooth Monday and said also that the Kansas City pilot "also seems to have a throat infection."

The hospital reported his condition was not serious.

## Rizzuto Claims Offer From Cards

**HILLSIDE, N.J. (AP)**—Phil Rizzuto said Wednesday he has declined an "attractive" offer to play for St. Louis Cardinals for the remainder of the season.

The former Yankee shortstop said Frank Lane, general manager of the Cards, called him Tuesday night and promised to have him in every game for the remainder of 1956. The Cards have 26 games left.

Rizzuto, who was given an unconditional release by Yankees Saturday, said he has a half dozen broadcasting and television posts to consider.

The 35-year-old ballplayer did not say how much Lane offered.

## Eskimos Cut Four Players

**EDMONTON (CP)**—Edmonton Eskimo football club announced Wednesday that four players, including three American imports, have been cut from the team roster.

The American players are tackle Charlie Olson, formerly with Denver University; center Veri Scott, University of Nebraska; and Dick Healy, University of Oklahoma. The Canadian is guard Bob Waugh, with University of Toronto last year.

This leaves Eskimos with 15 imports, including former UCLA star Jim Decker, who is out with a back injury.

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## Jackie Parker In Scoring Lead

**WINNIPEG (CP)**—Jackie Parker, Edmonton Eskimos' triple threat quarterback, has taken over the lead in the individual scoring in the Western Interprovincial Football Union.

Statistics compiled by The Canadian Press for games including Aug. 27 show that the former Mississippi State all-American has scored three touchdowns and kicked two singles, for 20 points. Tied for second place were the previous week's leader, Ed Verbe of British Columbia Lions, Earl Lindley of Edmonton and Bob McNamara of Winnipeg Blue Bombers, each with 18 points on three touchdowns. 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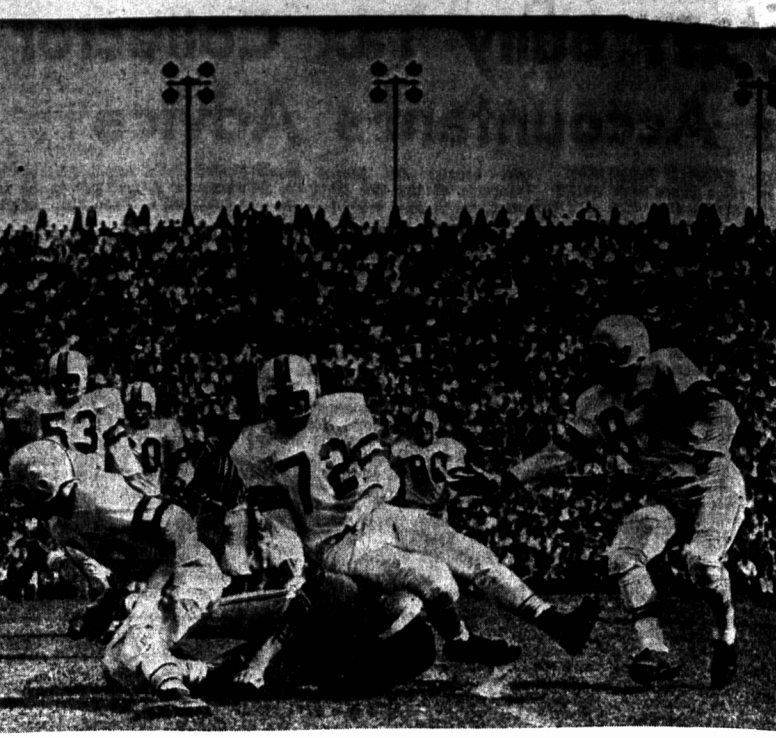
