### Recent Island Weather Best Described Erratic

Of late, island weather can best be described as erratic. Christmas is a day that records high temperatures and the first green festive season in quite a number of years.

It was about, and to some, it was sweet. Few, if any are happy with what has followed.

Monday night it was freezing rain, yesterday morning it was just plain rain and last night was varying between rain and snow.

The Charlottetown radio range reported that on eight o'clock Tuesday morning till late Tuesday evening the Charlottetown area experienced ice pellets, snow, rain, blowing snow and fog. The temperatures were a high of 32 and a low of 29 degrees. Winds during the day were 15 to 20 mph.

The Island Telephone Co. reported they had scattered breaks throughout the province and there were 12 poles down between Cardigan and Montague

and three down between Souris and South Lake.

All was well with the Maritime Electric Co. lines with no lines or poles down and service was normal.

Despite the weight restrictions the government plows were out clearing the main roads yesterday, though last night travelling was reported as being heavy.

Most side roads in the province were open, but unplowed. A combination of snow and mud made travelling on these roads so difficult and in some cases impossible.

Travelling was reported as hard going in Prince County but all roads were passable.

There was heavy drifting on the Western Road between Richmond and Alberton making travelling difficult.

It was heavy going on the Kings and Queens and Kings counties, also.
