UPPER METHODIST CHURCH.

The services in the above Church yesterday were of an unusually interesting character. The choir rendered some choice music, giving the Te Deum in a manner which reflected great credit on Miss Duchemin, the organist, as well as the individual members of the choir.

The morning service opened with the Doxology, after which a choir of boys and girls rendered most beautifully "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing," and also after prayer singing "Jesus the Light of the World" in a most touching manner.
