Kickoff Rally At Summerside Launches Hospital Campaign

SUMMERSIDE — If every wage earner in the area served by the Prince County Hospital would give one day's pay a year for three years the objective of the extension fund campaign would be reached, workers were told at a kickoff rally held last evening at the Canadian Legion Home.

The speaker was Rev. T. Henrich, a member of the hospital's board of directors, who briefed the workers on the procedures to be used in canvassing. The drive is now officially open.

R.A. Horne, general chairman of the campaign committee, presided and the workers' kits were explained by James Hogan, chairman of the general canvass.

Mr. Henrich told the workers not to be apologetic in their approach to the people on their lists because the lack of facilities at the hospital affects everyone. He said that hospital statistics show that last year there were 46,443 patient-days of treatment which represents nine days treatment for every family in the area.

Mr. Henrich started out by explaining what the hospital means to the community in its various capacities. He said that as a business it employs 200 people full time and its annual payroll is over a half million dollars.

As a school the hospital has 50 nurses in training and graduates an average of 17 trainees a year.

Irving will conduct a workshop for school teachers at West Kent School this coming Friday and Saturday.

Plans were also laid to prepare for the semi-final drama series leading to the 1965 festival. The semi-finals will be held on a regional basis this year. It was agreed.

President Eric MacGregor chaired the meeting.

Check Planned Into Student Loans

Dr. George Dewar, minister of education will investigate a statement made in Ottawa that this province has made no representation in the federal arrangement for more funds under the Canada Student Loan program.

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. State Undersecretary George W. Ball returned from West Germany Tuesday with "a good deal of optimism" concerning prospects for agreement on a NATO multilateral nuclear force.

Ball said "a week or two or three or four" would be allowed beyond the previous year-end deadline for a British Labor government to give the new treaty government time to decide its position.

But, he said, "I think the German government is very determined to try to make a success of this proposal."
