

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

WANTED A SPECIALTY.—Beer Bros.

Got One Year.—Alberte Ferre, Winnipeg's city comptroller, who stole \$7,000 of the city funds, has been sentenced to one year with hard labor.

The P. E. Island Hospital has received the following: \$14.45 from Valleyfield Presbyterian Church; \$3 from Mrs. Bagall, of New Glasgow; \$125 from Committee of Stratgathney Tea.

St. James' Picnic.—The annual picnic of St. James' Sunday School will be held on Thursday next, August 2nd, at Suffolk. No effort will be spared to make this picnic most enjoyable. A large attendance is expected and desired.

STRENGTH MOVEMENTS.—The Elliot arrived in Boston yesterday morning and leaves for Charlottetown this evening. She will sail again for Boston on Wednesday evening, August 1st.

The Fastnet leaves here for Halifax this afternoon at the usual time. The Miramichi arrived last evening with a general cargo and a number of passengers. She sailed again about midnight.

A WARNING TO OTHERS.—A Montreal despatch says: Ernest Boudac was sent to the Court of Queen's Bench at the September term for trial by Judge Dugas yesterday. The charge against him of keeping a public nuisance—otherwise a rooster, which is addicted to crowing lustily in the morning, and disturbing the neighbors.

SCOTT ACT CASES.—Stephen Toole, of Green Road, Lot 20, and Catherine Smith, of Fort Augustus, were yesterday arraigned before H. James Palmer, Stipendiary Magistrate for Queen's County, charged with violating the Canada Temperance Act. The case against Toole was a journal for further evidence, and in Mrs. Smith's case judgment was reserved. Both prosecutions were brought by Prosecutor Mathews.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon Angus McNeven and Neil McNeven, of Bonshaw, were each fined \$20 and costs or two months' imprisonment for being drunk and assaulting Thomas Merchaut, night watchman on the Cameron and Brown blocks. The assault was committed about one o'clock this morning. John Vail and Martin J. Parcell were each fined \$4 or 10 days for drunkenness, and Dennis Dullin was fined \$2 or 10 days for a similar offence.

THE LAST SAD RITES.—This forenoon all that was mortal of Mr. Francis Trainer was committed to the earth. The funeral took place from a heret residence on Granston Street west, at 9 o'clock to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, where High Mass was celebrated by Rev. P. J. Hogan. Thence it proceeded to the Roman Catholic Cemetery, St. Peter's Road, where the interment took place. The funeral was largely attended. The floral offerings were numerous and very handsome.

THE DOG CAME BACK.—A dog named Robert Horns, of St. John, went fishing at Echo Lake, eight miles from that city, two months ago, and has not been seen since he reached the fishing ground. Diligent search was made for him and much surprise was felt that not even his dog could be found. On Thursday, however, the dog walked into the house from the direction of the lake, looking much excited, and interest in the fate of Horns has revived.

PHOTOGRAPHS.—A visit to Mr. Cloud Hill's Photographic Studio just now will be found interesting. Mr. Hill has on display a large number of photographs of our most important local and general interest, and these views make excellent souvenirs of the Island, and would be excellent for sending to friends away. There are pictures of our churches, choir, and the popular preachers of our city churches, and some excellent pictures of interiors of private houses. Mr. Hill's collection is well worth seeing.

THE POLICE INSTRUCTED.—Stipendiary Magistrate Hazard charged the police force this morning with reference to their duty in the matter of enforcing the Canada Temperance Act, which came into operation to-day. He told them that it was their bounden duty to search all places where liquor was exposed for sale, and give information regarding the same to the proper authorities. He also referred to the prevalence of perjury in Scott Act cases in the past, and expressed his determination to promptly bring persons guilty of such offence in the future to the bar of justice.

AGAINST THE CITY.—Morton seems to be rather unfortunate in his law cases. Two actions against the city were entered on the docket of the court in session at Charlottetown. They were brought by Abraham Wilbur, one for false arrest and the other for false imprisonment. Wilbur was arrested and imprisoned for nonpayment of taxes on property which he owns in the city, but he has been living outside the city limits, and claims that his arrest and imprisonment were illegal, on the ground that he is a non-resident. The city settled both cases on Thursday by paying all costs and giving the plaintiff fifty dollars on account of damages.

HARRY LINDLEY, the comedian, is the author of an interesting work, "Merely Players," a true story of dramatic life. In speaking of his visit to Charlottetown, he relates a funny story at the expense of one of our prominent Masons also, of a farmer who, on one occasion, came to the theatre. LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

THE SCOTT ACT AGAIN.

Sir,—It is reported that the Government have appointed Mr. George Hughes one of the vendors for this city under the Canada Temperance Act. I cannot believe that the report is true, as it, if true, shows a weakness on the part of the Government which should not be exhibited. The law allows three vendors to be appointed, and these appointments should have been made at the one time without delay, and selected from parties in whom the Scott Act people have full confidence. They claim that for the due enforcement of the Act the vendors should be men who, in the past, have observed the law, and unless their nominees are appointed they cannot and will not be held responsible for the non-enforcement of the law. The Government, by hesitating to appoint such men, have not shown that desire for the observance of the law which the temperance people had the right to expect and it is to be hoped that whoever holds the appointing power will without further delay appoint men as vendors against whom no objection can be urged, and thus show by their actions that they intend to assist the working of the Act. Let the Act have a fair trial, and don't give its supporters any excuse for any failure in the future by appointing men as vendors who have disregarded its provisions in the past.
