MONDAY

It was announced over the week-end that Mr. Gordon Simons son of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Simons, Summerside, has been accepted as Acadia University delegate to participate in a summer study tour to be held in Europe this coming summer.

The large modern barn on the farm of Mr. Fenner Stewart on the Brackley Point Road, about eight miles from Charlottetown, was totally destroyed by fire which broke out at about eleven o'clock yesterday morning.

TUESDAY

"If there are any great objections to the present system of marketing potatoes the growers should have a plebiscite to determine if they wish to sell their potatoes through the Marketing Board or return to the old way of selling through the dealers," stated Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture in the Legislature yesterday afternoon as he spoke on the Draft Address debate.

Inspector William H. Nevin, in charge of "L" Division of the R.C.M.P. in this Province, was guest speaker at the weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

The speaker was introduced by Fred Cannon and thanked by Dr. Frank MacKinnon, who recalled the outstanding party played by Hon. David Laird of Charlottetown in the foundation of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police.

WEDNESDAY

The death of Creelman MacArthur Bruce Dickieson, New Glasgow, P.E.I., occurred suddenly at Toronto yesterday afternoon. He was in his 27th year.

Mr. Dickieson, who was a graduate of Prince of Wales College and had concluded three years in medicine, had recently accepted a position with Swift's in Toronto at laboratory work. He worked until noon yesterday at the plant but told his brother Arnold, with whom he roomed, that he was not feeling well and would remain in his room until evening.

Petty Officer Derold Floyd MacKenzie, 14 Pownall street will be part of the contingent of the Royal Canadian Navy (Reserve) which will attend the Jubilee Review by Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, of the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve at London, England, June 12.

McCormac and Mrs. McCormac due to absence from the province. The Lieutenant Governor was attended at the performance by his Naval Aide, Capt. J. J. Connolly, V. D.

An R.C.M.P. officer from Alberton detachment, Constable J. R. Sexton took top honors at the first Prince Edward Island Salon of Amateur Photography. It was announced by the Charlottetown Camera Club that the salon opens today to four day exhibition at the Harris Memorial Gallery.

Judging the 152 entries yesterday were Mrs. D. Gass, artist; Messrs. Don Sears and George Barter, professional photographers, who agreed that the show was commendable, revealing much promising talent.

A Women's Institute leadership course is being held at the Vocational School. This course is held annually for District presidents to enable them to carry on their district conventions, giving delegates a better knowledge of Institute work.

The course opened by registration attended to by Mrs. Nell Matheson, who welcomed and introduced the presidents. Mrs. Michael Doyle, president of P.E.I. W.I. presided.

A representative of the Netherlands Embassy in Ottawa, Mr. J. H. Athmer was in Charlottetown yesterday on official business. Mr. Athmer is assistant to Dr. A. S. Tuinman, Agricultural Attache at the Embassy.

He is interested in the welfare of the numerous Dutch agricultural immigrants who have come to this Province in the past few years, and in the possibilities of settling more of them on the island in the years to come. Yesterday morning he had an interview with Premier A. W. Matheson, and later talked with the Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture, and Mr. S. C. Wright, senior agricultural fieldman for the Province.

At noon he called on Mr. C. Lincoln Dewar, secretary of the P. E. Island Federation of Agriculture.

FRIDAY

"I feel that within ten years Souris will be known as the Gloucester of the Maritimes," stated Mr. William Acorn, Liberal Third King in the Legislature last night as he took part in the debate on the Draft Address.

Mr. Acorn was speaking of the development in the fishing industry in the Eastern section of the Province when he made the promising prediction for Souris. He stated that a fleet of eight draggers operated out of Souris last year. "Two of them started the season early and by the end of the year they had each landed over 5,000,000 pounds of fish. Those fish averaged 3.16 cents per pound with the result that each boat earned about \$31,000 for the year," stated Mr. Acorn.

"We built more roads at less cost last year than ever built before in this Province in one year," stated Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways who spoke in the Legislature last night on the Draft Address debate. "At our present rate of work I would say that within three or four years the roads left to improve in the Province will only amount to a trifle," stated the Minister. "During 1953 the Public Works Department completed 199.6 miles of road at a total cost of \$923,258 or an average cost per mile of \$4,625," he stated.

slam at clubs could have been made by South without any real difficulty. South's pass over the two no-trumps was certainly an extraordinary action, but for that matter, it was North's opening two-bid. True, the partners were playing weak two-bids, but it is super-evident that they did not have a full understanding on the scope of these bids, and in any case it is hard to agree with North's estimate of his own holding. By any normal (or logical) standard that holding fully measured up for an opening one-bid, and if North had made that choice the auction might well have proceeded:

Table with 4 columns: North, East, South, West. Shows card holdings for a bridge hand.

Offhand, it may appear that North-South could have done almost as well by doubling two no-trump, then also doubling any three-level contract that East-West "ran to," but this is not true — a three-heart contract could not have been severely punished.
