NORWAY'S ENGLISH-BORN CROWN PRINCE IS POPULAR FOR HIS DEMOCRATIC WAYS

BY MILTON BRONNER NEA Service Staff Correspondent LONDON.—Royal personages of other lands use warships or big, private yachts when they go voyaging. But when Norway's Crown Prince Olav and Crown Princess Martha arrived in New York to open Norway's pavilion at the World's Fair, they sailed in aboard an ordinary liner, such as plain folks use. Crown Prince Olav was not born to the royal purple, that is to say, he is not a prince by birth. His father, then Prince Charles, son of the King of Denmark, married Princess Maud, daughter of the late King Edward VII, and Queen Alexandra of England in 1896. The young couple were thus really kin, because Alexandra was a Danish royal princess. Every year Charles and Maud spent part of their time in England, living at Appleton House on the grounds of Sandringham House. It was here that their son was born, July 2, 1893. He was the present Crown Prince. Two years later Prince Edward was called to the throne of Norway. Thereupon, he took the Norwegian title of King Haakon VII. His boy had been christened Alexander Edward after his English grandmother and grandfather, but he was now given the Norwegian name Olav. Even after his parents became Norwegian rulers, Olav spent much of his infancy and boyhood in England. Norwegian became, so to speak, his father tongue and English his mother tongue. Some of the most charming yarns ever told about royal children are still related about him. One day, when he was only five, a little boy, son of a Norwegian big-wig, was visiting the royal family. Queen Maud took the lad on her lap. "Get off. That's Mama's place." "Get off! That's my place." The little boy got off. King Haakon took the child on his lap. Mount Stewart Honors Her Great War Dead A Mt. Stewart congregation honoring Great War dead of the community at special services Sunday was advised against cynicism by Dr. Cyril Macmillan of McGill University, special speaker for the occasion. Liberty and freedom were never in such peril as they are at the present time, he said. Men have forgotten the lesson of the last war and are preparing for the next. The responsibility for it rested with "you and me," Mr. Macmillan continued, "for not asserting our declaration against war." There were three things the last war should have left. The recollection of sacrifice, an impression of the dangers around us and the inspiration to meet those dangers. J. Lester Douglas, M. P., who followed Hon. Mr. Macmillan, in a brief address, said that the community were deeply indebted to him, on more than one occasion for his eloquent addresses. He asked all to take to heart his message to do all they could to promote peace and good will. The chairman for the occasion was Mr. George Clark of Mount Stewart, who made a fitting and touching address, the purpose of the out-of-door gathering, and to the sacrifices made by the honored dead in the great cause of freedom. In introducing Hon. Mr. Macmillan, he paid a high tribute to the distinguished speaker of the day. The religious part of the service was conducted by Rev. S. J. Boyce, pastor of the United Church, included prayer, the singing of the hymns, "On God our Help in Ages Past," "Lord of the East, Bend Thy Bowing Sides," by a mixed choir, and "Shall We Sleep Beyond the River" by a group of school girls, who had placed flowers on the monument. Mr. Ronald Jay was organist. The proceedings closed with the Benediction and the National Anthem. The Boy Scouts, under the leadership of Mr. Harold Shaw, and members of the local branch of the Canadian Legion were present during the service, which had been arranged by Mrs. J. J. Storey, consisting of the following ladies who are also trustees of the cemetery: Mrs. George Clarke, president; Mrs. L. E. Jay, secretary and treasurer; Mrs. M. J. Douglas, Mrs. Gordon Douglas, Mrs. Benjamin Bir.

Opens Investigation Into Marital Swaps (By The Associated Press) LANSING, Michigan, June 26—Prosecutor Thomas C. Taylor disclosed today he had begun a one-man grand jury investigation into the marital affairs of two Columbus, Mich., families which he said he understood had agreed to exchange wives and divide up their 14 children equally. The prosecutor said he had been informed the wives of George Davis, 42, and Clarence June, 47, had agreed to exchange places and that the Davis' 10 children and the June's four were to be divided so that each couple had seven. Justice Arthur H. Perkins is sitting as judge in the investigation. Taylor said he had presented seven witnesses and planned to put about 12 more on the stand.

"Stripping" Made In Germany Evidently BERLIN, June 26—The Foreign Correspondents Association of Berlin has forwarded to the Propaganda Ministry one of the strongest protests it has ever drawn up against the treatment accorded to one of its members, Mme. Eleanor Heinsdorf, a Pole of Jewish origin, who for more than ten years has represented the Warsaw Podchorazny and the Cracow Oodzielny here. Arriving at Tempelhof Airfield a few days ago after a holiday in England, Mme. Heinsdorf was met by a secret police agent, who ordered her to leave Germany by the first available plane. Permission to telephone to the Polish Embassy and the Propaganda Ministry was refused. When Mme. Heinsdorf declined to depart voluntarily, pleading her long residence here, showing her Polish passport with a German visa and producing her permit to remain in Berlin, she was stripped and searched. Her hair was taken down and combed and she was subjected to a humiliating examination. Mme. Heinsdorf was held in custody for three hours. In the meantime, however, an acquaintance who had seen her arrive but had been unable to find her at home, communicated with the Polish Embassy, which instituted inquiries. The embassy was informed that in Mme. Heinsdorf's absence her permit to stay in Germany had been revoked, but that in the circumstances she would be permitted to remain a week in order to clear up her affairs. Her passport has been returned. The protest of the Foreign Correspondents Association, while including what is virtually expulsion without a charge, stressed more strongly the physical treatment inflicted by the police. Heinsdorf, declaring that if this were to be a precedent, continued residence in Germany by foreigners would be impossible. The Propaganda Ministry in reply assured the association that this was an individual case and that the Ministry in future would render all possible aid to the foreign journalistic expatriates from Germany who had now reached twenty-three.
