MISS CHLOE ANN VIOLET, who began a fast sixty days ago, in Alexandria, Va., under an insane delusion that God had commanded her to commit suicide by fasting, died on the 5th inst. Although she claimed to have begun the fast sixty days ago, she was not all that time without nourishment. Several times a small portion of milk was introduced without discovery into the water she drank, and lately most extracts have been given as medicine. There seems to be no doubt, however, that she was without food for forty three consecutive days.

The Toronto Globe says: "The noble firmness of Lady Crawford and her son in refusing to offer a reward for the stolen body of Lord Crawford cannot be too highly commended. The effect will be most salutary in discouraging attempts to coin money in this way out of the hearts of bereaved relatives, whether money was the object of the perpetrators of this particular outrage or not. This self-denying action will also serve as an influential precedent in similar cases, should such unhappily occur. What the resolution must have cost the afflicted family can be estimated only by those who are in a position to make such a case their own. To rise in this way above the region of unreasoning feeling and to subject every other consideration to an ennobling sense of duty is not only in itself truly heroic, but is the highest possible tribute to the memory of the deceased Earl."

The Government Prosecutor, of Montreal, has opened an investigation into what is believed to be one of the foulest crimes that has lately disgraced the Province of Quebec. A young girl, named Caroline Gauthier, who her parents in the parish of St. Julie, sold off all her property for cash, with the intention of going away with a young man named Francois, a drunken, dissipated character, with whom she was desperately in love. She suddenly and mysteriously disappeared, but Francois remained, and has since been flush with cash, although previously he never had a cent. Every effort has been made to obtain traces of the young woman, but without effect. Some farmers who searched the neighborhood of the girls late dwelling found a comparatively new made grave, from which it is surmised a corpse had been taken lately. The general opinion is that Francois murdered the girl for her money, buried her in the place referred to, and subsequently exhausted the body.

NEWS NOTES.

A young girl in New Orleans was recently fined \$5 for kissing a man.

Chicago has had 104 murders in three years and about 600 deadly assaults.

The London Spectator fears that before long England will have a new form of oratory, tending to the native American type, the method of a more humorous Cobbett.

A cablegram asserts that the question of imposing an export tax on grain is mooted in Russian Government circles. Should such a tax be imposed on Russian grain, the result would tell heavily in favor of wheat raisers on this side of the Atlantic.

The Gladstone Government, it appears, likely to find a surplus on its hands of about twelve or fifteen million dollars in April next. It is supposed that the occasion will be improved in making a substantial reduction in the obnoxious income tax.

Rather a good story reaches us from Bavaria, where a poor cavalryman has been punished for calling the steed of his officer a villainous brute. The sentence was three weeks imprisonment for using abusive language to an officer's horse! According to this, what Island farmer would escape!

Blaine's circular note to the Republics of Central and South America states that the United States Government has no desire to interfere with their domestic concerns, but simply seeks to promote good feeling between the countries so that its commercial interests in the South may not be injured. The letter refers to the great influence exerted by European Powers over the American Republics, and suggests that a convention of delegates from all the countries concerned should be held at Washington in November next, to provide mutual guarantees against interference or supervision from abroad.

It is again rumored that a valuable discovery of anthracite has been made in Nova Scotia. Should the rumor prove true, the fact will be extremely important. A large deposit of first rate anthracite coal, easily worked and well situated for distribution in Nova Scotia or New Brunswick, would be of immense value to Canada. Such a deposit may have been found in the sister Province, but curiously enough has so often been shouted over a fancied find of that sort that faith is less facile on that point than hitherto. We earnestly hope, however, that rumor in this instance will turn out true.
