## Waterfront Activity Reported 'Picking Up'

Activity along the Charlottetown waterfront has been showing signs of pickup during the past couple of days. On Wednesday two ships arrived in port and tied up at the Railway Wharf.

The Irving Oil Company tanker "Bravingbrook" of 18,000 tons, under the command of Captain Oltmeyer arrived from Aruba in the Dutch West Indies with a mixed cargo of petroleum products for the bulk storage plant.

The discharging of her five and a half million gallon cargo of gasoline and stove and heating oils was completed late last evening and the huge tanker sailed on the high tide at shortly after 11 o'clock. She is headed back to Aruba for another shipment of oils and gasolines for Atlantic coast ports.

The other vessel to arrive Wednesday was the M.V. Brion. Here she took on a cargo of lobster, canned, live and cooked, potatoes and turnips.

The 475-ton vessel sailed shortly after noon yesterday bound for Seven Islands, Bay Comeau, Quebec City and Montreal.

Thursday morning the S.S. Magdalen secured up at Burnside and Bell's Wharf to take on a part cargo of Island produce for the Magdalen Islands. Enroute she will top up her holds at Pictou, N.S. The freighter left Charlottetown late yesterday afternoon.

The next ship due is the M. V. Fauvette, scheduled to arrive in port this morning. The 1,000-ton vessel will take on general cargo, including a quantity of crated potatoes for the U.S. Airforce base at Goose Bay, and sail later today.

## New Publisher is Announced For The Guardian And Patriot

W. J. Hancock, general manager of The Times-Herald, of Moose Jaw, Sask., for the past six years, has been appointed publisher and general manager of The Guardian and The Evening Patriot.

Mr. Hancock, who takes up his new duties next Tuesday, succeeds Ian A. Burnett, publisher of The Guardian since 1952, who resigned recently and has moved to Guelph, Ont., where he is launching a new business in association with his brother, George M. Burnett.

The new publisher of the Charlottetown newspaper began his association with The Times-Herald 11 years ago, first as an advertising salesman and later as advertising manager, prior to becoming general manager in 1952. He also served for two years as advertising manager of The Observer, the daily newspaper at Sarnia, Ont.

It is expected Mr. Hancock, accompanied by Mrs. Hancock and their children Richard, Michael and Amanda, will arrive in Charlottetown on Monday. During his years in Moose Jaw Mr. Hancock was active in many community enterprises and Mrs. Hancock was associated with a number of women's civic activities.

Mr. Hancock is a past director of the Rotary Club and was a member of the council of the Moose Jaw Chamber of Commerce and the Board of Stewards of Moose Jaw's Zion United Church. He was also vice-president of the Moose Jaw Civic Centre organization, a body of citizens which is pressing plans for a centre providing modern facilities for hockey, skating and other forms of entertainment.

## CLC Leader Sees Union As World Peace Solution

MONTREAL (CP)—Claude Jodoin, president of the 1,200,000 member Canadian Labor Congress, said Thursday that peace in the world can be attained only through establishment of free trade unions in every country of the globe.

Mr. Jodoin spoke before 1,000 Canadian and American delegates attending the 25th annual convention of the International Brotherhood of Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers.

He said it is only just that labor he called on to play such an important part in world security because the great masses that fought for peace in two world wars came from the ranks of organized labor.

The CLC president said labor is wise to the ways of warmongers and will continue to fight against Communist and Fascist ideologists until dictators have been wiped from the face of the world.

Canadian labor leaders were not worried about the anti-labor legislation being enacted in the United States because of the ability of RFL-CIO leaders in overcoming tremendous problems.

## PM Reminds U.S. Businessmen Canada's Interests Must Be Met

By KEN KELLY, Canadian Press Staff Writer. CHICAGO (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker Thursday reminded United States businessmen that Canadians expect the business policies of U.S. subsidiaries to be based on Canadian considerations and to be in the best interests of the Canadian economy and people.

His outspoken reminder was given in an address to a joint luncheon meeting of the Chicago Rotary Club and Chicago Association of Commerce and Industry.

The prime minister is here for Canada Day at the Pan-American Games which he visited in the afternoon.

"Canadians welcome the investment of American dollars in industrial and resource development in Canada," he said. "But it must be underlined that Canadians ask that subsidiaries conduct themselves in the best interests of Canada first."

Canadians expected that the business policy of every company operating in Canada, be it owned or controlled by Canadians or Americans or overseas, would be based on Canadian considerations and be in the best interest of the Canadian economy and people.

The prime minister spoke shortly after arriving here by air from Ottawa.

In an airport interview he reiterated Canadian opposition to Chicago's plan to divert additional waters from Lake Michigan into its sewage system.

## Indian Army Prepares To Reoccupy Outposts

NEW DELHI (Reuters)—The Indian Army Thursday night was reported preparing a bid for the "peaceful" reoccupation of a northeast frontier outpost seized by Chinese Communist soldiers late last month.

Indian troops were said to be moving to forward areas of the Northeast Frontier Agency, where the now-Chinese-held Longju outpost was set up by India in April.

Informed sources said the Indian force was under orders to try to reoccupy Longju without the use of arms and to open fire only in self-defence.
