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**THE WRONG SWITCH**—Thos. Vaughin, a young man employed in the Royal Electric works, Montreal, came very nearly being killed a few nights ago. He was working at one of the dynamos and turned the wrong switch, with the result that he received a current of 10,000 volts. Vaughin fell unconscious, but when taken to the hospital revived.

**HILLSBOROUGH FACTORY**—From October 20th, 1898, to June 7th, 1899, there was received at Hillsboro Dairying Station 766,570 pounds of milk. The amount of butter manufactured was 32,953 lbs, the average price realized being 18.55 cents per lb. The total receipts were \$6,167.51. In last month 376,000 lbs of milk were received.

**FOR CHARITY'S SAKE**—In the printed proceedings of the last annual convention of the Grand Lodge of Freemasons of this province, it is stated that Hon. Benj.
