A VERY STRANGE CASE.

Miss Helen Beers who was born Blind has Her Sight Restored.

Miss Helen Beers, of Newtown, Conn., was born blind fifty years ago, and on Saturday last for the first time in her life she was able to see. Many oculists have said her case was hopeless, but a short time ago she came under the observation of Dr. L. M. Wilson, of Bridgeport, who is on the staff of the Manhattan Eye and Ear Hospital, of New York.

After a careful study of her case he believed that an operation would restore her sight, and he considered it to be a particular form of congenital cataract. The operation was performed by Dr. Wilson in the presence of a large number of surgeons at the Mr. Andrews' Hospital. On Saturday afternoon the bandages were removed for a few moments, and Miss Beers became wild with joy when she found that she could see perfectly well. She utterly failed to recognize objects she had handled all her life. Whatever she sees she tries to pick up, although it may be seen through a window or be on the opposite side of the room. Dr. Wilson says it will be very interesting to observe how she will learn to read for the first time. She now has a letter in her hand which she has written in her own hand.
