## Report Leader Of Rebellion In North Sumatra Is Arrested

JAKARTA, Indonesia, (AP)—The Medan Radio said Thursday night the leader of North Sumatra's army revolt has been arrested and replaced by an officer loyal to the Indonesian central government.

TRADE MINISTER HOWE GIVES VIEWS Sees Continued Prosperity OTTAWA (CP)—Trade Minister Howe Thursday forecast another round of prosperity for Canadians in 1957, though he anticipated there would be a "significant" drop in house building and some problems in export markets.

Even with the steady increase in personal consumptions in Canada, capacity in consumer industries is under no strain. On the foreign front, Mr. Howe saw the Middle East crisis as bringing "new elements of uncertainty" in world trade, "the effects of which are not now discernible."

INVESTMENT RECORD SET Capital investment, the expansion of plant and other production facilities, swelled to a record of more than \$7,500,000,000 from \$6,300,000,000 in 1955. But because of shortages in goods and credit, the program fell short of the \$8,000,000,000 anticipated.

HOUSEING MAY DECLINE "Of all the major investment sectors, residential building is the only one likely to show a significant decline," he said.
