GRANTS TO AUTHORS AND ASSOCIATIONS The Centennial Commission, in co-operation with the Canada Council and the Canada Foundation, announces a programme of grants to authors and associations to encourage the production of publications on the occasion of the Centennial of Confederation. Preference will be given to projects in the arts, the social sciences and the humanities. Under exceptional circumstances consideration will be given to projects in other disciplines. The maximum individual grant will be \$5,000. The book must be published in Canada before September, 1967. The author must be a Canadian citizen or a resident of Canada since 1962 or represent a Canadian association. Applications will be received and assessed by the Commission until January 1, 1966.
