Balkanization Of Canada Called Accomplished Fact

VANCOUVER (CP)—A Montreal geographer says geographic balkanization is already a fact in Canada.
Ludger Beauregard, of the University of Montreal, told a symposium on Canadian regionalism here. Canada must be reinvented if the country is to survive intact.
Use of the phrase "co-operative federalism" is an admission that true federalism does not exist in Canada, he said.
He described Quebec as "a little more separatist than the other eight provinces—Ontario is excluded because it has no reason for being separatist."

always walk hand in hand, in Montreal as well as in Winnipeg. The Italians of Montreal, for example, have their own parishes and schools."
Prof. Warkeinton said southern Ontario has been "consistently characterized by inhabitants who have tended to be conservative, stable, restrained, with a respect for property, a belief that material progress is a fundamental virtue, a sense of responsibility in public matters."
"A characteristic that has been equally persistent is that the men who have controlled the governmental, ecclesiastical, educational and financial institutions have been predominantly of British origin."
Although Ontario's population is becoming steadily more urban, it is still made up of "placid, cautious people," he said.
But the problems of urbanization are causing Ontario to re-examine its role, and "it is finding it is not the leader it thought it was."

"we know our success (at this) has brought considerable wealth to our province and Canada as a whole."
Prof. Hardwick said Canada is usually analyzed by historians, political scientists, journalists and politicians, who are often "graduates of Queens and Toronto (universities) and see Canada only as the Lawrence lowland culturally divided."
During daytime sessions Saturday, geographers heard 31 papers read by members of the association, covering aspects of geography ranging from land formation to map-making and the relationship between work and residence for city dwellers.
DISCUSS RUSSIA
Three papers were presented on Russia.
In one of them, Professor

Zbigniew Mieczkowski of the University of Manitoba said Russian attempts to control her economy regionally have failed.
He said there are indications that since Premier Nikita Khrushchev was ousted, there has been a trend towards tight central control of Russia's economy.
The idea had been applied variously since about 1920, he said, but in 1957 Khrushchev set up 100 economic regions to decentralize the Soviet economy. Six years later he changed his mind and initiated a recentralizing movement undoing all the earlier work.
Other papers covered the development of Russia's processed forest products industry, and the emergence of her petrochemical industry.
Robert M. Bone, of the University of Saskatchewan, said Russia is striving to become the world's leading producer and exporter of all types of forest products.
He said Russia relied on forest products exports as a major source of the foreign currencies used for her assistance programs to Asian and African countries.

Experts Ponder On Trend In Event Of Mao's Death

HONG KONG (AP)—Mao Tse-tung's death in the near future could, in the opinion of some Western experts here, lead to improved relations between China and the Soviet Union and a united Communist front on opposing U.S. involvement in Viet Nam.
But this is by no means a unanimous opinion. Others believe Mao's absence from the Peking scene would make no difference. This view is largely held in Tokyo.
The speculation on the course of China after Mao has gone some about after weekend reports that the Communist Chinese leader has been taken seriously ill. One report reaching the British Government—and branded as strictly speculative—is that Mao may have suffered a stroke. He is 71.

Some British informants in Hong Kong say that Mao's age is beginning to tell on him and that he is almost constant care and attention from medical experts who keep him secluded as much as possible.
But they don't list him as an invalid or as losing his grip on China's basic Communist policy.
"Communism in China has not seen the power struggle, the infighting, that has characterized communism in Russia," said a Westerner.
"The death of Stalin foretold a major change in Russian policy, but that does not necessarily hold for Mao and China. Mao's death could have one soothing effect on the China-Russia quarrel, however."

of the losing finesse or the bad suit break, as the case may be, and arrives home in safety.
Here is a case in point. West cashes the K-A of clubs and continues with a club to the queen. East then plays the ten of hearts.
The fact is that most declarers at this point would win the heart and start to draw trumps by cashing the A-K. West would show out on the second trump play, and that would be the end of the matter. They would go down one, eventually losing a spade to the jack.
But the pessimistic declarer—the cautious declarer—would make the contract. As soon as dummy came down he would start worrying about a bad trump break after winning the ten of hearts with the ace. He would take steps to deal with a bad trump division if it existed.
He would play a diamond, followed by the K-A of spades and another diamond ruff.
Having by now reduced his bid to the Q-10 of spades and Q-6 of hearts, he would play a heart to the king and lead the established nine of clubs. Whether East ruffed this trick or the next one, his J-9 of spades would be trapped and his apparent trump trick would be liquidated.
Maybe it pays to worry!
