MAKE HAY

Quality of hay is even more important than quantity although farmers must match one with the other. Later cutting may mean greater volume but less food value. Another considerable loss is spoilage because of bad weather during the haying period and failure to top the stack of loose hay or bales so that heavy rains will shed off rather than soak right through.

During the haying operation hay is first. It is a matter of out guessing the weather, but more important still is to make a hay when the sun shines.

With light hay crops in prospect and larger live stock populations to feed, all hay possible must be put up in such a way and at such a time that neither volume nor feeding value will be overlooked.

MORE
ANTIBIOTICS IN MILK
The use of Penicillin, Streptomycin and other antibiotics for the treatment of mastitis is generally effective if used properly. The milk from these treated quarters should not be used for at least two to three days if shipped to plants where they manufacture cheese. The reason for this is that a sufficient residue of the antibiotic is still in the milk and will inhibit the growth of the cheese starter.

It was brought to my attention recently that several thousand pounds of milk were dumped down the drain in one of our Island plants due to the fact there was too much of these antibiotics in the milk. Why not co-operate and use this milk for calves and pigs rather than shipping it. One or two shippers being careless in not following this advice can cause very serious losses to the producers.

APHIDS
In some areas of the province aphids are becoming a serious threat to grain fields, chiefly barley and mixed grains.

Aphid damage can be spotted from some distance by the yellowing of the leaves which reduces the yield greatly. Spraying or dusting should not be considered until the number of aphids reach-

es one hundred per plant or more. However, if a few aphids are present in a crop and the weather remains hot the number can increase rapidly to a danger point in a day or so. If the weather remains cool aphids are unlikely to become a serious pest. Spraying or dusting should not be considered if the grain has headed out due to the damage done to the crop by the spraying or dusting operation. Action should be taken when the numbers reach a dangerous level.

Spraying recommendations are: a 25 per cent Wettable Powder Malathion at the rate of 2 pounds per one hundred gallons of water, or a 50 per cent Malathion emulsion at the rate of one and one-half pints per acre to one hundred gallons of water can be used. Both of these should be used at the rate of one hundred gallons of water per acre for best results.

For dusting a 4 per cent Malathion Dust at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds per acre should be used. The material will be cheapest for a spraying operation using the 25 per cent Wettable Powder.

Farmers are urged to keep a check on their crops for this insect. If more information is desired, contact the Provincial Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown.
