Island June Pastures Termed 'Finest Ever'

Dr. Hannam's state of health has been causing concern for some time but his friends were not prepared for the suddenness of their loss.

Dr. Hannam was a man of dignity who was never petty or small and his qualities did much to improve the image of agriculture and of farm people to the public mind.

Dr. Hannam's greatest success was in the harmonizing of the conflicting interests which make up Canadian agriculture. Under his guidance the Canadian Federation of Agriculture became a truly national body with a truly national viewpoint.

Good judgment and urbanity were his great assets in handling the numerous situations which arose over the last 22 years.

Dr. Hannam will equally qualify as a superior agricultural statesman who not only made Canadian agriculture greater but who also ranged across the world farm front and in so doing caused Canada to be recognized as a power for world improvement and a factor to be recognized in a variety of international fields.

As is so often the case with great men the dead leader was a modest and humble man not concerned with projecting himself as a leading player in the drama but dedicated to elevating others to higher levels.

In order to keep in touch and to have first hand knowledge of agriculture which he loved he operated his own dairy farms and took a deep pride and interest in his cattle and crops.

A great man has departed and his like may not soon again be seen.

While the women deserve all the credit for their good work, it is of interest to learn that the first group was actually formed by a farmer's institute in York in 1911.

HAY AND CONSCIENCE

Haymaking requires fine weather and the past three years have not been providing it. Generally and sometimes acutely the operation has been complicated by the intervention of the Sabbath day which imposes a responsibility on the farmer's conscience which is difficult to reconcile with the economic facts of life as represented in good or poor harvests.

We have noticed in other agricultural areas that important harvesting operations are carried out on Sunday and public opinion condones the practice.

Eventually we may expect some changing of attitude here but at the present time with most people conscience reigns supreme over economic consideration.
