**REGATTA.**—The regatta at Souris on Monday next promises to be a great success. There will be two sail-boat races and a dory race. There will be special railway fares between Souris and other points. Those who wish to have a pleasant outing should attend.

**WORTH RECOGNIZED.**—The Educational Review for September contains an article on Mr. J. D. Seaman, Principal of Prince Street School, which will be very appreciable by his many friends. **AT KELLY'S CROSS.**—The Sacrament of Confirmation will be administered at St. Joseph's Church, Kelly's Cross, tomorrow afternoon. In the morning the remains of the late Father Duffy will be transferred to the new church grounds, and the monument recently erected in his honor will be unveiled. Pontifical High Mass will be celebrated by His Lordship Bishop Macdonald, and a sermon appropriate to the occasion preached by Rev. Dr. Doyle.

**AN ILL-FATED ISLANDER.**—A letter was received in Charlottetown a few days ago from Monterrey, Mexico, dated September 2nd, saying that Alexander M. McInnis, an Islander, who has lived in Monterrey for four years, had been sand-bagged and robbed in Boston, while returning to Monterrey from a visit to his home, which is on the Colville road, about twelve miles from Charlottetown. He had strength enough to reach his ship in Boston, but collapsed shortly after. The ship called at Galveston, and here he was placed in one of the city hospitals suffering from a fractured skull. The letter received here states that he was in a bad condition. The recent storm may have claimed him as a victim, but it is to be hoped that the Islander is safe. Inquiries are now being made for more information.
