Heber M. Sweeney of Bridgewater, N.S., has been holidaying at attending the races at Dufferin Park track, Toronto. It is possible that Heber is on the lookout for more speed and we won't be a bit surprised if he returns home the owner of another good pacer. In the past such excursions have usually resulted in his buying one or more horses.

We regret to learn that our friend Percy Welsh, representative of Bell's remedies, was taken ill last week, due to over-exertion. We trust that this is only temporary and that he soon will be around as usual.

We are very glad to hear from an old horseman friend, R. S. 'Dick' Starr of Wolfville, N.S., as follows: "I am one of the old timers who has always been a great admirer of the standardbreds and at one time developed some good rampart colts, including Andrew Starlight, Ralph S., etc. I was well acquainted with the late Robert Edwards, noted horseman of Halifax, his son and brother, James and Frank, J. Holey Hooper, Newton Lee, Spurgeon Gammon, J. R. Lamey and many others I could mention, as well as many of the old time drivers such as Harry Lydard, Peter Carroll, Frank Boutiller and Fred Warren.

"I purchased Royal Knight 2:17 1/2 from the late G. Holey Hooper but I never raced him and used him in the stud all the time. I showed him and won many top honors. He sired a lot of useful colts but none of them were very speedy. One of the last foals was put of a mare called Belle S., raised on the Island and sired by Commodore Leydard. While she had a lot of speed I did not race her. In 1915 I moved to Ontario and lost touch with the horses in the Mar-

times. While there I was more closely associated with the heavy horses, particularly Clydesdales. I expect your files are filled with old clippings but I am taking a chance that you can find room for some notes by Spurgeon Gammon, who was one of our finest horsemen and whose articles in the harness horse papers were greatly read. Thank you friend Dick, for remembering us and bringing to mind so many owners and drivers that we admired very much.

Spurge's article was entitled "Weekly Talk on Turf Matters" and it gave a list of the record trotters from Lady Suffolk, who on October 13th, 1845, at Hoboken, N.J., trotted a mile in 2:29 1/2. In 1871 Goldsmith Maid, then 14 years of age, set a new record at Milwaukee, Wis., of 2:17, which she lowered the following year to 2:16 1/2, and two years later in 1874, to 2:16 and three times afterwards that same year she set up new world records, finally on September 2nd at Boston, Mass., trotting in 2:14, which remained the world's record for four years when Rarus lowered it to 2:13 1/2.

Maud S. was the next great trotter to appear and as a six-year-old September 8th, 1880, she lowered the record to 2:10 3/4. She set up a new world's record twice as a seven-year-old and twice as a ten-year-old, and finally in her eleventh year at Cleveland, Ohio, on June 13th, 1885, trotted in 2:08 1/4. Nancy Hanks, whose blood flows through many of the great trotting performers today, became the next star in the trotting firmament. As a six-year-old hooked to a bike sulky she set up a world's record of 2:07 1/2, August 17th, 1892, and on August 31st lowered that to 2:05 1/2, and finally on September 28th she trotted to a record of 2:04. The bike sulky was a makeshift affair with the frame of the high-wheeled sulky attached to a pair of bicycle wheels. It would be seconds slower than the modern bike because of the driver's high perch and the fact that it weighed 60 pounds. The list then shows the remaining champions, The Abbott 2:03 1/2, Crenus 2:03 1/2, Lou Dillon 1:58 1/2, Uhlans 1:58, Peter Manning 1:56 1/2, and brought up to date it is now Greyhound 1:55 1/4.

Spurgeon Gammon will be remembered by many as one of the most gentlemanly and considerate horsemen ever known. He was a good trainer, a good driver and for years he was a driver or official at races in Charlottetown, Halifax, New Glasgow, and other places. One afternoon in September, 1923, he called the writer up saying that he had a trotter that was another Bill Shank and that he would sell him for \$1,500. His description was so good that we borrowed the money and sent it along. Before he arrived Mr. McLure and I had left for Wisconsin with the expectation of selling about 75 pairs of foxes, but the deal did not materialize. On the way home I was cheered by the thought of having a drive behind the wonderful new trotter—The Yank. However, there was another disappointment. The Yank was lame from a shoulder injury received in a race on the way over. That fall we were busy with the foxes and in late December I took a car to Michigan. On the way back I stopped off at Toronto, saw a pacer winning over the ice with ease in 2:15 1/2, bought him for \$2,300. He was Dan Patchen and he was entered at Mount Clements, Michigan, where I arrived a few weeks later to drive him and just had time to get some done on the bike. He finished 3-3-2 and quite a lot of money was burned up on him by people who thought he should have won.

I looked him over and found he had a very sore foot, poulticed it and had his shoes sharpened and gave him a couple of easy workouts. The night before the international ice races at Windsor, which was the next meet I was approached by parties from Milwaukee to have Sep Thane in one match. Sep had been racing at Mount Clements also but hadn't had very much success. I declined the very kind offer and the next afternoon beat the top pacers of the two circuits, stepping the mile in 2:13 1/2. Dan was a front runner and I got him away on high and never ceased teaming him. That evening I was so tired I fell asleep and didn't get up until nine o'clock. When I came down the drivers were all congregate around the fireplace in the hotel and Wert Mallow said, "Here's the fellow who didn't know anything about horse racing." The races over he brought Dan Patchen back by express and the first thing I did when I got to the stable was to ask Ernie McTague how The Yank was getting along. Ernie just grinned and said "I think he's pretty good." Before giving Dan a let up we took them both down to the ice and The Yank could trot right away from him. I then decided to send him to Mount Clements the following year and everyone knows the result. He won and set up a new world's trotting record on ice with Ernie McTague driving him.

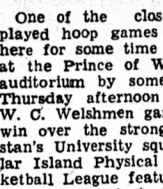

One of the closest and best played hoop games to take place here for some time was witnessed at the Prince of Wales College auditorium by some 300 fans on Thursday afternoon when the P.W.C. Welshmen garnered a 52-48 win over the strong Saint Dunstan's University squad in a regular Island Physical Fitness Basketball League feature.

Showing a spurge of power all season to be undefeated in five league starts up until that contest, the S. D. U. boys went against a slim 4-point margin against an aggressive P. W. C. quintet who have now garnered an equally good win and loss record that puts them on a tie basis for the league leadership. In addition to giving the Welshmen a tie for the leadership, the victory in itself has been an event for the City college boys. It is recorded to be their first victory over the Saints representatives in the past four or more years.

It really tightens up the big six-team loop race too, among the four leading contenders. Saints and P. W. C. are now deadlocked for the top position with 10 points each with a summary of five wins and one loss. M. C. A. hoopers are in a close running second place spot with four wins and three losses for eight points in seven league starts. League champions for the past two seasons, the Summerside R. C. A. Flyers are well up with the leaders with six points made up of three wins and three losses for third place.

Holding down the cellar positions are Summerside Schurman's with one win and four losses for two points while Ray's Millionaires are at the bottom of the heap with a luckless summary of six losses in as many starts. With not many games left in the schedule, it looks like the battle for the present four top teams who will in all likelihood be the four playoff teams. According to most ardent hoop followers, the league playoffs this year will be one of the hottest in history and will produce a brand of close hoop play that will leave it to anybody's guess as to which team will be the final winner.

An interesting sidelight in the presentation of prizes at the conclusion of the 5th Confederation Bouspiel held at the Charlottetown Curling Club on Thursday night, was the presentation of an engraved glass to young Barry MacDonald of Charlottetown, 13-year-old school boy for the J. S. MacDonald rink which won the Confederation Bouspiel championship.

Inscribed with the title "Best Sweeper of Bouspiel" the glass was presented to the youthful curler by Chief Justice Thane. Barry took over the visiting Moncton rink and the visiting lady fans, with whom the young and ardent curler made a big hit during the week-long bouspiel competitions.

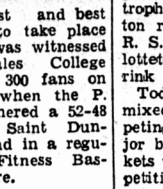
Skippering his own rink in the Provincial High School Curling championships here earlier this month, Barry piloted his formidable team to a more creditable showing. They upset the winning Don Cameron rink in one match and made a fine showing even when losing, dropping the other matches by the slimmest of margins. Barry not only competed with the winning Confederation rink, but was also the managing spark-plug for the entire team. Keen as any of his seniors and more experienced rink members, Barry took over the complete job of seeing that the team was on tap for all their matches, and never missed a trick where it concerned the team's activities.

His father was a member of the rink that year, but gave up the position this year to his son, while he himself played with another foursome in the Regal Flour competitions. Today the bouspiel will feature mixed matches with ladies competing for the first time in a major bouspiel hereabouts. 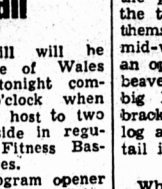
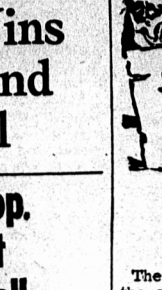

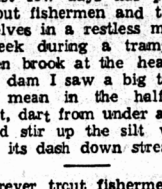

The April weather prevailing for the past few days has put both the trout fishermen and the trout themselves in a restless mood. In mid-week during a tramp along an open brook at the head of a beaver dam I saw a big trout, by big I mean in the half pound bracket, dash from under a sunken log and stir up the silt with its tail in its dash down stream.

Wherever trout fishermen foregather the talk turns to trout and trout tackle. It's the weather, I guess, for the trout season is still seven weeks and two days away. On Thursday afternoon I listened on two old timers converse in long tones and a far-away look in their eyes about the "Red Bank" and "Joe's Hole" on the Morell, and wonder how the big ones, that make those spots a favourite hangout in April and early May, would react to a blob of juicy Garden Hackles.
