Consolidated School Advocated For Mt. Herbert

A large and enthusiastic meeting of the rate payers of Mt. Herbert School was held on June 27th. This school has been closed for the past year due to many pupils attending graded schools elsewhere. It was unanimously decided at the meeting that an effort should be made to induce the surrounding districts to amalgamate and build a graded school. Mr. Gay MacEachern, the newly elected trustee along with Mr. Russell Farquharson and Mr. Arnold Burhoe are the board to carry out the business of the meeting. History is indeed repeating itself for in this district 43 years ago the first Rural Consolidated School in Canada was founded by Sir William MacDonald. This beautiful school was closed after only seven years' operation due largely to transportation difficulties in the winter time. This era was before the day of motor buses and improved or paved roads. Those who have reaped the benefit of a more advanced education are now desirous of providing similar educational advantages for the present generation.
