

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

HALIFAX WANTS TRIN. NOMINATION DAY, (partial elections) Thursday next.

DR. EVERETT'S lectures are interesting and instructive. OATS are selling in Halifax at from 45cts. to 47cts. per bushel.

THE POLICY of "SILENCE AND DO NOTHING" is still adhered to by the Government.

A LITERARY CLUB—Both Montreal and Halifax have taken hold of the idea of forming a literary club.

HON. J. C. YATES, member of the Privy Council of Bermuda, died on Thursday last at Victoria Hotel, St. John.

CHARLOTTETOWN DEBATING CLUB—Is it not nearly time to think of reorganizing the Club for a fall session? The evenings are getting long.

RETURNED TO HIS OLD LOVE.—Mr. Geo. E. Miller, timsmith, has left Summerside and has opened a shop on Great George Street, near the "Dominion House."

EDUCATIONAL.—The Minister of Education of the Empire of Japan and one of his confidants, of the Japanese Cabinet, are in Quebec. They are 'taking hints.' Some of our new Ministers might go and do likewise.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.—Messrs. W. E. Dawson, Charlottetown; M. Wright, Centerville, and John Goff, Woodville, have been appointed members of the Board of Education, vice Hensley, Kelly, and Arseneau, resigned.

APPOINTMENT CANCELLED.—Mr. William McDonald, S. P. W. for King's County, (one of the most popular and efficient officials under the late Government) has been discharged. Mr. Joseph Fairchild takes the office.

SIR JOHN AT BELLEVILLE.—At the Belleville Liberal-Conservative demonstration, the reception given to Sir John A. Macdonald was almost royal. The whole country turned out to welcome him. About 15,000 persons heard him speak.

HORSES AT THE CENTENNIAL.—Dr. Jenkins' trotting stallion, Royal Harry, attracts considerable attention at the Centennial. Altogether, the Canadian horses on exhibition rank high. Among the heavy draft stallions is the Canadian horse Dan Donald, weighing 2260 pounds—five or six hundred pounds more than any other horse on the grounds.

ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION.—The 103rd anniversary of the founding of Pictou was celebrated on the 15th inst. in a manner worthy of the descendants of the sturdy Highlanders who arrived here so long ago in the Hector. The idea of the celebration originated and was carried out by the young men of the town, who were desirous of inaugurating a celebration of the day in a manner which would afford a model for future occasions.

THE FISHERIES.—During the past week a number of American fishermen have arrived in port. From what we can learn the large American fishing fleet have not been so successful as during the past few years. A few of the vessels have taken a fair catch, but the majority of them have not had an average take. Vessels from the Labrador reports fishery there exceedingly good. We also hear good reports from some parts of Newfoundland. The fishery around the shores of Cape Breton is below the average.—North Sydney Herald.

SABBATH SCHOOL CONVENTION.—The sixth Sabbath School Convention of the Maritime Provinces was lately held in the Presbyterian Church at Summerside. The following officers were nominated and elected for the ensuing year:—J. R. Calhoun, M. P. P., of Summerside, President; J. W. Harris, Esq., Wolfville, N. S., W. Brehaut, Esq., Summerside, and R. N. Hagarty, Esq., Sussex, N. B., Vice-Presidents. Secretaries: W. D. Baskin, St. John, W. W. Stumbles, Jr., Charlottetown, Daniel Stewart, Esq., Summerside, Treasurer, Robt. McC. Stavert.

PRESENTATION TO SIR JOHN.—A very pleasing event took place at the U. E. Club, in the presentation of the beautiful case voted to him a few days ago by the people of Maidstone, County Essex. It will be remembered that Mr. McGregor, M. P., challenged the contest between Sir John and Mr. Mackenzie, and that Sir John headed the poll by a majority of 900 votes. The deputation which made the presentation consisted of Mr. J. C. Patterson, M. P. P., Mr. John McHugh, of Maidstone, Major J. Lewis, of the Essex Times, Mr. Solomon White, and Messrs. Joseph A. and Achille A. Quillette. Having dined with Sir John, they proceeded to the reading room of the club, where speeches were made by most of the members of the deputation, and Sir John replied at some length.—Toronto Mail.

IMPROVEMENT OF GEORGETOWN.—A correspondent of the Advertiser proposes that the howling wilderness around Georgetown—Georgetown Common—shall be turned into fruitful gardens. 'A consumption devotedly to be wished!' The correspondent says 'if the Common comes into the hands of a properly constituted authority in Georgetown, which I ardently hope it soon may, it could be rented out in the following manner: Say there are 400 acres, divided into eight acre lots, with the necessary reservation for roads—say 16 acres—there would then be 48 Lots, with a fixed rental for ten years, the rent varying according to the eligibility and situation of the lot. When a sufficient number of applicants would offer, the Lots to be put up to public competition, the competitor offering the highest bonus for the possession of any Lot, should become the lessee, in addition to the usual rent of each Lot, the occupant of the lot to have it free for three years, in consideration of the clearing and fencing, then to be subject to the annual rent fixed on each Lot for seven years. Besides, the bonus accruing from the sale of the lots, if all could be let in this way, would give Georgetown a revenue of over \$500 for local improvement, which, if judiciously and economically expended, would be of marked benefit to our town: besides the pleasure, beauty and benefit of highly cultivated suburbs, instead of the howling wilderness that we now behold.' We hope to see this plan vigorously discussed in the columns of the Advertiser.

So long ago as the year 1829, in a juvenile production entitled "The Young Duke," Mr. Darnley boldly announced his intention of running a career in the House of Lords as well as in the House of Commons. The assurance does not come from behind the character of the novel, but from the author in his own person, in critiquing the authors of the day.
