NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)

LONDON, June 19. The "Times" Berlin despatch says that the Turkish Basha-Bazonka who attacked the Montenegrins at Krainavo, were Roman Catholic Albanians, wishing for an embodiment with Austria, and adopting the forced means of a raid to acquaint Congress of their desire.

If Northern Albania were Austrian Antivari might be ceded to the Montenegrins without danger to the Vienna government. The Albanians are a steady, industrious, well-behaved race, as gallant as the Montenegrins, and might be made to act as a counter poise to the additional power acquired by Prince Nicholas.

The Russians are sending reinforcements against the Rhodope insurgents, who seem to be making preparations to take the offensive. The British fleet has arrived off Prinkipos, one of Prince's Islands.

BERLIN, June 19. The Congress met to-day at 2 o'clock, and adjourned at a quarter past four.

OTTAWA, June 19. Sir John A. McDonald has sued the "Brantford Expositor" for \$10,000 for libel. The boat race between Hanlan Morris, which takes place to-morrow at Pittsburg, is exciting great interest here. The opinion being that Hanlan is sure to win.

To the Editor of the Examiner:

SIR,—The other day I visited the Town Hall for the purpose of buying butter. But, lo, and behold, the butter in the baskets had been under the heating process so long, that the prints got very much attached to one another, and were with difficulty separated, and only in a disfigured state! I really felt sorry for those good country housekeepers (who must have taken great pains to get up a good looking print of butter) when their baskets were stripped, the prints were so soft that it was with difficulty that they could transfer the butter from one basket to another. This state of things causes a good deal of grumbling amongst the women. And it is not much wonder. If the citizens tax country produce that is exposed for sale, they should, in return, give the vendors fair play. Now, we know that the Market Hall is no place for butter or anything else that will spoil with the heat; and, I think, it is asking the country people to put up with greater inconvenience than we would like to suffer ourselves. Besides all this, butter melted in the market cannot be so good to the buyer, as when it can be bought cool, and no doubt but what it injures the sale to a certain extent. The very name of making our only Hall a butter market seems to me to be progress on the lobster fashion.

I would then make a suggestion, and that would be to raise the Market House, Tower, big Donald and all, at least four or five feet, and build in a good brick wall underneath; then put in good large windows, and clear the basement out, and make either a butter market of it, or a meat market. It would be a cool place in summer, and comfortable in winter. A floor could be laid over the whole of it, and the walls and ceilings plastered. Then, with easy flights of stairs, it would be a right, good apartment. Some may object to climbing up high steps to weigh meat, but that is no objection, as the present accommodations for weighing are faulty in the extreme. Think, Sir, of a farmer having meat for sale, having to shoulder a quarter of an ox, and to carry it first in through throngs of people, jostling this lady and that lady, until they are pretty well greased over, then sousing it down upon a scales almost level with the floor, then picking it up again, and wending his way out again, as he came in, with his coat more like a tallow candle than anything else, when the whole thing could be avoided by having a scales outside of the building, similarly arranged to a hay scales, with the beam inside. This would save a great deal of worrying and dragging, and would meet the objection against high steps.

Hoping something may be done to make an improvement in the market arrangements. I remain yours, RICHARD WEEKS.
