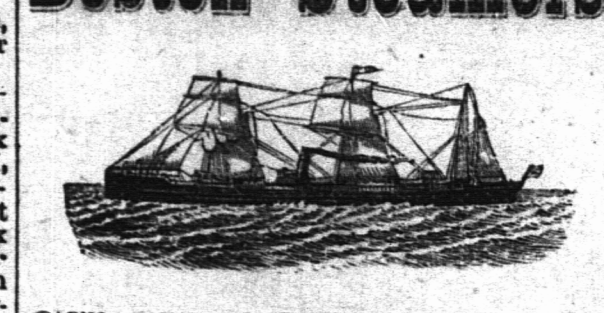

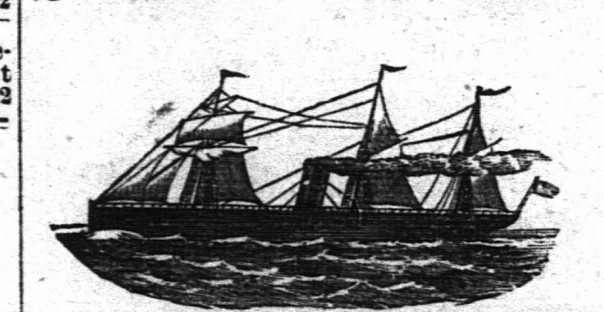

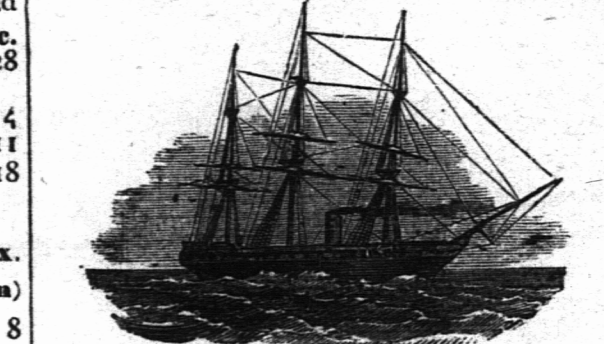

Theosophy is a Humbug.

St. Louis, May 16.—The Rev. Narayan Sheshadri, D. D., and son, B. N. B. India, are now in St. Louis. The doctor is a native of India. In the course of a long interview with the Times' correspondent he said: "I was once a Hindu Brahmin. I was a Christian now. I was converted to Christianity in 1843, under the Scottish Presbyterian missionaries of Bombay. Then I received a theological education in the French Scottish institution of Bombay, as it was then called, now Wilson College, so named in honor of the late Rev. Dr. Wilson. I became a missionary after receiving my degree as doctor of divinity. For many years I labored among my countrymen at Bombay. For the past 25 years I have labored in the dominions of his Highness Vizam, a native prince, where I founded a mission and laid out a Christian settlement. Starting with two Christian converts twenty-five years ago, it now contains 2,000. I came to the United States on account of my failing health, and am accompanied by my son, Yeshwant Rao. I landed in San Francisco April 15, and have travelled slowly east." After some general conversation he was asked: "What is theosophy?" He replied: "Consider the literal meaning of theosophy—Theos, God, and sophia, wisdom—God-wisdom. Theosophy, my dear sir, is a humbug, and theosophy is Buddhism. It is atheism. There is absolutely nothing in theosophy at all. Its followers deny the existence of a God. Practically it is Buddhism, greatly deteriorated in spiritual quality. Now it seems to me that Col. Olcott, who I believe, is now somewhere in the east, takes a great delight in teaching Buddhist priests and in sending them to England and the United States to convert the people to theosophy or Buddhism. I saw Mme. Blavatsky once. I think she was a Hindu woman, but a great juggler. You can obtain a complete exposure of Mme. Blavatsky's jugglery by sending to the publisher of the Southern Christian, Madras, India, for a pamphlet published by him.

An Inebriate's Home.

THE CHURCHES.

AN Ottawa despatch says at a meeting of Victoria College alumni society on Tuesday Professor John Burwash, late of Mount Allison College, was elected president.

A son of a Modoc chief is the president of the Christian Endeavor Society in Yainax Indian School, Bly, Oregon.

REVIVAL are reported in the Presbyterian missions in Persia. In the old town of Seir there has been a great work reaching nearly every house and almost every individual.

REV. DR. PRINSON, of Philadelphia, is said to have bought fifteen acres of ground at Northfield, adjoining Mr. Moody's seminary, on which he proposes to erect a cottage for his own use and a "House of Rest" for missionaries who have come home to recuperate.

Two young students of the General Theological Seminary (Episcopal) of New York, have renounced the Protestant faith and gone over to the Roman Catholic church. They had been at the seminary only three months.

As a result of evangelistic meetings held in Washington for five weeks by the R. V. E. P. Hammond, hundreds have professed conversion.

The Foreign Missionary Union, formed among the students of English universities, who hope to devote their lives to foreign missionary work, is reported to now number one hundred and a xty-five members.

The Presbytery of Baltimore has formally protested against the confirmation of the General Assembly of the appointment of the Rev. Dr. Charles A. Briggs as a professor of Biblical Theology in Union Theological Seminary of New York.

Dr. Cross, of the Free Church of Scotland Mission on Lake Nyassa, Africa has upon the roll of his school the names of 300 children rescued from slavery.

At the Convention held in Aberdeen last month for the deepening of spiritual life and the promotion of practical holiness, which was largely attended, and the proceedings of which attracted much public interest, ministers and leading laymen of various churches took part, among whom was the Rev. H. G. Moulton of Cambridge, Principal of Ridley Hall.

The Bishop of Solor and Man, Dr. Bardely, an earnest Evangelical prelate, inaugurated the opening of the Bishop Wilson Theological School, a new educational institution on the island. The new divinity school is to be affiliated with Durham University. The Church in England is paying ever more and more attention and care over to the work of a much neglected part of her work, viz., the special theological training of her clergy.

The Diocese of Liverpool has been making great strides under its devoted Evangelical Bishop, Dr. Ryle. Within the last ten years the total expenditure on building, enlarging or restoring churches, and on extending the work of building mission churches and parish rooms, has been over £560,000. There is no more active worker in England than Bishop Ryle, septuagenarian though he is.
