63 Baseball Players At Bear Record Price

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Howard Kohn, 25-year-old right-hander, was the first man to be picked Monday in the major league player draft. Kohn was drafted at a record price of \$200,000 by the St. Louis Cardinals.

Kohn, once a prized Detroit property, had a 7-8 record in 1962. He pitched in the major league last season with Syracuse of the International League.

NFL Player Draft Gets Slow Kickoff

CHICAGO (AP)—Dave Parks, versatile Texas Tech end, was grabbed by San Francisco 49ers as the No. 1 pick of the National Football League annual player draft which got off to a slow start Monday.

After the next two teams—Philadelphia Eagles and Washington Redskins—quickly chose guard Bob Brown of Nebraska and halfback Charles Taylor of Arizona State respectively, the first round bogged down for two hours, 20 minutes.

The delay came as the fourth team to pick, Dallas Cowboys, apparently were stymied by the drafting of Parks and Taylor, which they reportedly planned as top choices and finally picked Scott Appleton, 235-pound Texas tackle.

The six-foot-two, 190-pound Parks, was a fourth-round choice by San Diego in last week's American Football League draft.

Brown, 269-pound Nebraska star was a first-round AFL choice by Denver. Taylor was selected in the second AFL round by Houston.
