

S' side Airman Named To Team

SUMMERSIDE — Sgt. M.P. (Mike) Susick, a member of the flight engineer staff at the Maritime Operational Training Unit in Summerside is again one of the members of the Canadian Bisley team.

Sgt. Susick was born in St. Boniface, Manitoba in 1924 and completed his education in that city prior to joining the RCAF in 1943. He served as an aircraft technician with 6 Bomber Group in England until the war ended, whereupon he returned to Canada.

In 1946, he again enlisted in the air force and served in ground crew until 1956 when he obtained his wings as a flight engineer. He spent the next two years as a flight engineer on Neptune aircraft in Greenwood, N.S., after which he was transferred to Summerside to his present employment as an instructor.

Sgt. Susick first became interested in rifle shooting while in high school and in 1941 he won the Manitoba provincial individual high score trophy, shooting both .22 and .303 rifles. From 1951 to 1955, "Mike" gathered a considerable number of trophies for his marksmanship appearing at several Dominion of Canada provincial competitions.

In 1956 he won the NRA grand aggregate at the provincial annual full bore competition. In 1957 he was a member of the RCAF Greenwood team which won the

intra-RCAF Maritime competition and was also selected to the Bisley team for that year.

During 1958, he again placed well in the DCRA competition and won several matches at the PEI RA, including the Governor-General's bronze medal.

Because of his excellent showing in rifle competition throughout Canada, Sgt. Susick has again made the Bisley team for 1959, marking him as one of the best marksmen in the country.

City Film Board To Promote Distribution Of Tourist Film

The Charlottetown Bureau of the National Film Board of Canada will be putting on a special drive within the next three weeks to promote the tourist film "Tourist Go Home."

This film is especially recommended for showings to service clubs, tourist bureaus, staffs of hotels, motels, restaurants, service stations, department stores, transportation companies, and many other community groups.

The film has had two showings on the Island. It was shown at a meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade last week and at a meeting of the P.E.I. Tourist Association at the Charlottetown Hotel Tuesday evening.

Representatives of the film board indicate that according to a recent survey one out of every nine visitors from the United States last year credited Canadian films with influencing their decision to visit this country.

This particular film tells the story of a mythical "Anti-Tourist Lodge of Canada" whose only aim is to keep people from travelling about and enjoying themselves.

Secretly obtaining an unedited tourist film, which they recognize as one of their more troublesome problems, the league convert it to their own nefarious use by abstracting unfavorable sequences which would normally be censored.

They get some excellent footage of a discourteous, careless motel service station attendant, of personal touch, of a town without adequate directional signs and of a restaurant lacking a distinctive menu.

John K. Martin, representative of the film board states that boards of trade and other such organizations in other island centres would be of great help in promoting this film. He urges that any group or organization on the island wishing to show this film get in touch with him at his office in the Dominion Building in Charlottetown.

J. George MacKay, minister
