NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY.—The Natural History Society will meet on Thursday next, 14th inst., at 8 p. m., in the Philharmonic Hall. Col. J. Hunter Duvar will read a paper entitled, "Some enquiry into the ethnology of the Island." He will deal chiefly with the Indian races that inhabited the Island at the time of its discovery.

FOOTBALL.—The Halifax papers report that an exciting game of football between the Wanderers and Dalhousie College teams was played on the grounds of the former on Thanksgiving Day. The game was declared a draw in favor of the Wanderers, the Dalhousie team having made three touchdowns for safety. There were about 2000 people present during the match.

THE TURF.—Clarke's mare Maud C. easily defeated Mahon's Bronze Chief at the Moosepath (St. John) races on Thanksgiving Day. Two heats were trotted. Time, 2.42, 2.39.

There was a very pretty running race on Moncton Driving Park, on Thursday. The contestants were Hopeful and May Queen. Hopeful won in two straight heats. Time, 54 and 55. Horsemen say that Hopeful is destined to make his mark on the turf.

GREAT MATCH RACE.—The match race between the pacers Albert E. and Harry G., owned respectively by George Essory and P. P. Gillis, will take place on the Driving Park next Monday afternoon, at 2 o'clock. The race will be for a purse of \$200, and will be mile heats, best three in five. Both animals are very fast, and, as they are well matched, a close and exciting contest may be expected. The admission to the Park will be 25 cents, with no extra charge for the grand stand. A large attendance of spectators is expected.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—The steamer City of Sydney, from Japan to-day, brings news to Oct. 13. Count Okuma, minister of foreign affairs for Japan, was returning from a cabinet meeting, when Kurishina Tsunki, aged 50 years, politically envious of the count, threw a bomb at his rival. The bomb exploded at the count's feet, inflicting deep wounds on his right leg, and slight wounds on his right hand and face. The would-be assassin drew a short sword and killed himself by cutting his throat. The Count's leg was amputated above the knee.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Relics of the Cronin Tragedy.

CHICAGO, Nov. 8. For some time past the sewer at the intersection of Evanston Avenue and Buena Avenue has been flushed and running over; to-day the sewer-cleaners removed the cover from a man hole and prodded among the rubbish. Beneath the water two valves were unearthed—one of leather, the other only the remains of a paper one. In the leather valve was found Dr. Cronin's prescription book with several prescriptions bearing his signature. The paper one dropped to pieces, and from it rolled a mass of tattered clothing that bore evidence of having been cut in strips with a sharp knife. The only intact garment was in the centre and encircled the doctor's case of surgical instruments. The surgical case and prescription book bore the doctor's name. Every article of outward clothing was recognized by Conklin and a dozen other friends as the property of the murdered doctor. All these things were found one block from the spot where the bloody trunk was discovered. The paper valve is supposed to have been the one purchased by S. B. Simonds from A. P. Revell & Co.

Struck a Rock.

VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 8. H. M. S. Amphion, with the Governor-General and party, left Victoria yesterday morning for New Westminster. A dense fog prevailed, and when about 25 miles from Victoria the vessel struck a rock and commenced to make water rapidly. The pumps were set going and the ship put back to Esquimaux at full speed, arriving at 8 p. m. The Admiral ordered the ship to be docked and the dry dock was prepared. The ship was kept afloat by listing and entered the dock about midnight. The amount of injuries is not yet known. The vice-regal party came ashore and are now at the Driad Hotel.

OTTAWA, Nov. 8. Private advices from Victoria show that the published report of the accident to the steamer conveying the vice-regal party was greatly exaggerated. No one was alarmed and no danger was imminent. His Excellency will reach Ottawa in about ten days.

The Newfoundland Elections.

HALIFAX, Nov. 8. All the members of the Newfoundland government have been defeated. Fenelon, Colonial Secretary, is defeated in Harbor Main. Penny, Surveyor General, is also defeated in Carbonear. Brigus returned Clift (opposition). The government is deeply snowed under. There were two full tickets in St. John's, and the opposition ticket was carried in its entirety—six all told.

A Sensational Article.

KINGSTON, Ont., Nov. 9. In the last issue of the Freeman the Catholic organ here, is an article on the subject of separate schools menaced by political and religious demagogues. It says "the schools are our own by an entirely just title, and before we shall see them taken from us or impaired in their efficacy we shall lose even life itself if necessary." Public schools of Canada are characterized as "Godless and highly injurious to even the morals of our children."

'Twas Told At Dinner.

ATHENS, Nov. 8. The Government organ Acropolis asserts that at a recent dinner at the British Legation count Herbert Bismarck told Premier Tricoupis that Germany unreservedly recognized Turkey's sovereignty in Crete and that it behooved Greece to accommodate herself to the peaceful efforts of the great powers. Incoupis replied that Greece recognized Turkey's rights in Crete in just the same measure as the powers recognized Turkish rights in Egypt, Cyprus, Roumelia and Bosnia, and therefore would not limit the freedom of her policy by binding promises.

The Lightermen's Strike.

LONDON, Nov. 8. Lord Brassey, in a letter to the master lightermen, concurs in the advice of Cardinal Manning and the Lord Mayor, that the masters surrender to the employees.
