B.C. Pioneer Visits Island

Frank E. Woodside, retired chairman of British Columbia and Yukon Chamber of Mines, is visiting his old home, relatives and friends at Hamilton and Kensington. Mrs. Joseph Sheen is a sister and brothers include Keir, Archie, William and Harry.

Mr. Woodside was prominent in the pioneer life of Vancouver, being chairman of the Board of Aldermen for many years. He came to Vancouver about the time of the Klondike gold rush, travelling via Boston, Aspen, Colorado, and the Kootenays. Intensely interested in public affairs and oratorically inclined he campaigned to preserve and enlarge the now famous Stanley Park.

Another project which drew his interest was the move to eliminate the 500 mile "Panhandle of Alaska," which many claim has been throttling the development of the province by British Columbia. Mr. Woodside, in his research, has carried on correspondence with officials in Washington, D.C., relating to the purchase of Alaska from Russia and has also had access to agreements made between Britain and Russia.

Employment High In Prince County

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN Employment in Prince County is at the highest level ever reached, E. G. Cannon, manager of the national employment office here, said yesterday.

He added that though there was no shortage of workers in the area except occasionally when certain types of skilled operators are needed, this was mainly due to the big backlog of unskilled workers in the county.

On August 20 this year there were 340 men and 152 women registered for work. A month ago on July 25 there were 467 men and 154 women and on June 19 there were 491 men and 172 women. These monthly figures indicate a steady upward trend in employment, the manager said, and compared with the totals as of August 21, 1955, when the figures read 362 men and 154 women.

These are not the totals of men and women receiving benefits from the unemployment insurance commission as they include a large number of those who are uninsurable for different reasons. For instance the totals for this month show 492 men and women registered as available for work but of these only 255 are drawing benefits. Of the others only 90 are from Summerside area with the balance located elsewhere in the county.

The peak period of unemployment in Prince County was reached on the report of March 18 this year when 1,841 men and 426 women were registered. In addition there were 1,100 fishermen who are eligible for benefits only during the winter months.

number registering for work was the fact, Mr. Cannon, said, that far fewer residents of the county had left the province in the spring than in previous years. He believed this may have been because conditions in the province appeared better than elsewhere.

He also noted that a considerable number of those who did leave for other parts of Canada have come back again and more of them are still returning.

The six cow herd of J.A. MacLeod and Sons, Dundas ranked fifth among the group with 6-15 cow herd. His herd average was 10,274 lbs. milk; 431 lbs. fat; 4.19 per cent with a B.C.A. of 218 in milk and 132 in fat.

The Fairview herd of A. MacRae and Sons, Charlottetown ranked sixth among the herds with 16-25 cows which included some very high producing herds. The 23 cows in the MacRae herd averaged 10,409 lbs. milk; 430 lbs. fat; 4.22 per cent with a B.C.A. of 126 in milk and 132 in fat.

The 11 cow herd of W.A. Moase and Sons, Kensington averaged 9,449 lbs. milk; 401 lbs. fat; 4.25 per cent with a B.C.A. average of 122 for milk and 126 for fat. This herd ranked tenth in Canada among the 6-15 cow herds.

N. W. MacLeod and Sons, Cardigan had a herd average of 9,380 lbs. milk; 379 lbs. fat; 4.04 per cent for their thirteen cows with a B.C.A. of 124 for milk and 121 for fat. This herd ranks 15th in Canada for herds with 6-15 cows.

The eleven cow herd of Earle MacRae, New Westshire averaged 10,112 lbs. milk; 401 lbs. fat; 3.97 per cent with a B.C.A. of 123 for milk and 119 for fat. This herd ranks 17th in Canada for herds with 6-15 cows.
