Royal Bank Cuts Mortgage Rates

MONTREAL (CP)—The Royal Bank of Canada announced Monday that effective immediately the interest rate on new mortgage loans made by its branches under the National Housing Act will be five per cent, reduced from 5 1/2 per cent.

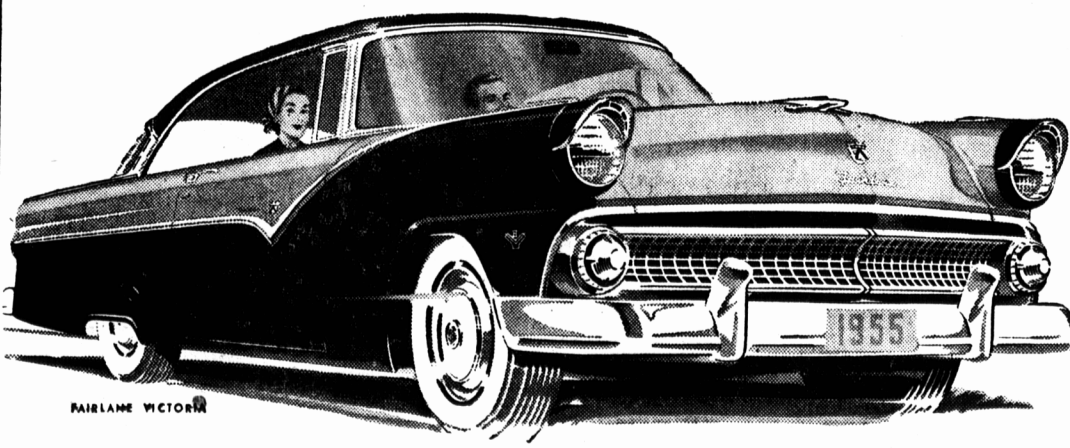

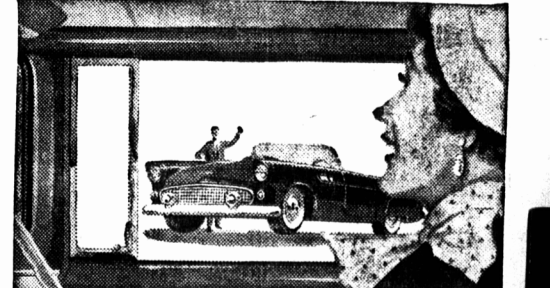
