MR. COMSTOCK TAKES HIS SEAT

Lobster Fishery Regulations

WILL NOT GO INTO OPERATION THIS YEAR.

The Redistribution Bill Will Not be Passed This Year.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

OTTAWA, May 11.—Mr. Comstock, the newly elected member for Brookville, was introduced in the House of Commons yesterday which was private members' day.

A number of motions for papers were asked and questions answered.

Charlton's bill raising the age of consent from sixteen to eighteen was read a third time and passed by 68 to 29. Of the Ministers, Laurier, Fielding and Joly voted for the bill, while Davies, Dobbell, Blair, and Fitzpatrick voted against it.

Mr. McInerney, asked what course the Minister of Marine intended adopting in regard to changes of lobster regulations recommended by Commissioners.

Sir Louis Davies said that in so far as the new regulations withdrew any right from fishermen they would not be adopted this year.

It is vaguely guessed that the Government will not press the Redistribution bill this session, but will be content with bringing down the measure and allowing it to stand over.

Your correspondent finds no ground for this report.

SALE OF CATTLE.

Mr. Heartz's Great Herd Distributed

A large number of people attended the sale of standard bred cattle at the farm of Benjamin Heartz, Esq., considering the cold day. About 100 cattle were sold, twelve or fifteen going to New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and the balance distributed through the Island. The cattle did not bring near their value, but were advertised to be sold without reserve. The principal purchasers on the Island were Albert Mutch, of Lot 48, who secured the beautiful 5-year-old cow 'S'.

Mr. M. J. Munnie of Belvedere; Mr. J. W. Woods of Lot 48, three heifers including Penelope from the great bull 'C' owned by Mr. Fred Guard of St. George; Mr. J. C. Clarke, secured Betty of Belvedere, a heifer from Masena's Prince; Mr. Olyden, of Margate "Lizzie H." 3 years old, from the prize cow 'Beauty of Belvedere'; Mr. Wm. Clarke, Wilshire, the famous cow 'Cana Meri'; Mr. John C. Clarke, secured Betty of Belvedere; Mr. Ludlow Jenkins, of New Dominion, chose "Excella," half-sister to the famous cow 'Beauty of Dela,' the latter with six or seven other prize winners being knocked down to Nova Scotia's famous dairyman, Rufus Starr, of Port Williams, Mr. Owen Sullivan, of Vernon River bought two fine young Holsteins, a bull and heifer, the bull being from Clara B. the greatest milker on the Island, which was purchased by Charles Palmer, Esq. The Royalty people showed their good judgment in not allowing everything to leave the vicinity of Heartz's Farm and we noticed Mr. Edgar Heartz securing two beauties, also Mr. John Stewart, of Marshfield, James Essery, Union Road, and Mr. James Roper, all getting animals of superior breeds, Messrs McMillan and Dawson replenished their ready-made stock by several purchases. Mr. McWilliams, of the Royalty got the great cow 'Rioters Catherine,' and Mr. E. E. Shaw two nice ones, one of which 'Jemell,' was a great favourite of Mrs. Jones. Several fine animals will come to the city, among which is the Beauty of Belvedere, which Mrs. Jones held at \$300 purchased by A. N. Large, Esq., together with two others, Silver Bell, secured by P. P. Archibald, of the Queen Hotel, considered one of the best judges in the city. The great cow, Beauty of Brockville, will be found in the stable of Geo. E. Hughes, Esq. Mr. E. W. Taylor displayed his good judgement by buying the great milker 'Masena's Prince'.

Mr. H. Turnbull, who supplies St. John, N. B., with milk, bought nearly a carload of Holsteins; but the bulk of this great stock has been distributed throughout the Island, except some younger stock purchased by Mr. Barrett Henderson for the North west.

ANOTHER VIEW

Mr. Martin's Speech in the House of Commons, on Branch Railways in P. E. Island.

Sir, Your report in our issue of the 4th of May, inst., hardly does justice to the able speech delivered by Mr. Martin, M.P., for East Queens, on Monday, May 1st, in the House of Commons at Ottawa.

Your correspondent speaks of the small attendance of ministers and members on that occasion; but does not explain that usually on Monday's many of the Ontario members do not return until late in the evening, as they usually go home on Friday night. Your correspondent says that only Sir Louis Davies was present of the ministers; but besides the Minister of Marine, Sir H. Joly de Lotbiniere occupied a seat during Mr. Martin's speech, and several other ministers were in and out during its delivery.

Mr. Martin dealt very fully with the large expenditure made by the Province of Prince Edward Island for railway construction, and showed that none of the other provinces had so liberally contributed towards that purpose. His statement, on an interruption from an Ontario member, that Ontario had unloaded bonds of the Grand Trunk Railway amounting at Confederation, to \$25,000,000, and from which not a dollar has been received by the Dominion, was a genuine surprise to many in the House; and his reference to the loan made by Ontario previous to the Union to the Upper Canada Bank, which was also charged to Ontario's account, although it was never returned, showed that Mr. Martin had closely studied all matters that would strengthen the claim of his Province.

Although it is true that the attendance on Monday evening was not large; yet the fact remains that there were twice as many as when the Budget Debate was finished on Friday evening. I am, with thanks for your space, Yours Sincerely,
