An Indian was fined \$5 for drunkenness, and a summons was issued for the dealer who sold him the liquor. A man, arrested for drunkenness and interfering with the Gospel Army, was fined \$20, and an assault case was withdrawn on both parties paying costs.

The Gospel Army made a successful attack on the strongholds of Satan, in the Academy of Music last evening. In consequence of the Academy being occupied to-night and to-morrow night by the "Kerry Gow" Company, the Gospel Army have no place of meeting. We learn that the Y. M. C. A. of this city has refused them the use of their Hall.

A DUKE'S ATTEMPT to CUT WAGES.—Hop pickers on the estate of the Duke of Edinburgh, in the county of Kent, Eng., finished work on the 25th inst. The usual price for picking hops is eighteen pence a basket, and the Duke offered to pay them only a shilling. This created a great uproar among the workmen, who made serious threats and prepared to carry them out. The Duke became frightened at the demonstrations and yielded to the demands.

SEVERAL important shipments of Clydesdale have been made from the Clyde during the past few weeks. The Allan steamers Scandinavian, Carthaginian, and Grecian, have all had on board some valuable lots, including several noticeable purchases for Canadian breeders. Mr. Anna, of Pickering, Ont., bought six pedigreed horses from Mr. Rytb, of Blackiebank, including one very fine colt, half-brother to the famed horse Knight of Snowdon, and the beautiful filly Gazelle. Other Canadian purchasers have been—Mr. Miller, of Brouham, Ontario; and Mr. White, of St. Mary's, Ont.—London-Canadian Gazette, 10th.

Among the physicians eminent in their profession whom the British Provinces have contributed to Boston are Doctors A. E. McDonald of Parmenter Street, and James A. McDonald, of Charleston District. Dr. John E. Somers, one of the leading physicians of Cambridge, and Drs. Cunningham and Walsh, of Cambridgeport, are from the same section, which has contributed its full share of able men to the professional, business and industrial prosperity of New England.—Boston Pilot. Drs. McDonald, Walsh and Cunningham, above mentioned, are P. E. Islanders.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Judge Thompson's Successor. OTTAWA, Sept. 28. J. Norman Ritchie, Esq., Recorder of Halifax, has been appointed to the vacancy on the Bench of Nova Scotia, caused by Judge Thompson accepting a portfolio. Judge Ritchie's father was a Judge, and his brother is Sir William J. Ritchie, Chief Justice of Canada. Another of his brothers was an Equity Judge of Nova Scotia. It is the only case on record in Canada of four Judges in one family.

A Black War Cloud in a Clear Sky. LONDON, Sept. 28. Fighting has been going on between the Turkish troops and Albanian volunteers. The Turks in a recent battle lost two hundred killed, and the Albanians one thousand. Great excitement exists in Syria over Turkey's imperative orders for the mobilization of the reserves. A black war cloud has suddenly appeared in the clear sky.

The Antigonish Election. OTTAWA, Sept. 28. A writ has been issued for the election in Antigonish. It will take place on the 16th of October. Mr. Samuel McDonald, of Inverness, will be brought out by the Grits to oppose the new Minister of Justice. A writ has also been issued for the election in St. John on the 20th of October.

Big Bear's Sentence. REGINA, Sept. 28. Big Bear has been sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. Two-by-Two and others of Big Bear's tribe were sentenced to two year's imprisonment. Red Eagle and four other Sioux and five Cree Indians were each sentenced to four years in the penitentiary.

Fatal Shooting Accident. ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Sept. 28. A fatal accident occurred while four men were deer stalking in the interior. One man named Drewers was shot dead, and another was dangerously wounded by the other two men, who mistook them for deer.

The Eliza Armstrong Case. LONDON, Sept. 27. Mr. Stead, editor of the Pall Mall Gazette, Mrs. Jarrett and several others who have been committed for trial for the abduction of Eliza Armstrong, will undoubtedly be acquitted by the jury.

A Victim of Rum. HALIFAX, Sept. 28. Mr. James Foley, lawyer, for years an editorial writer on the Chronicle, committed suicide by cutting his throat from ear to ear. He was a brilliant writer, but wrecked his life by rum drinking.

A Great Revival. HALIFAX, Sept. 28. A great revival is in progress here, under the Evangelists, Meikle and Gerrier. The Salvation Army are here storming the ramparts of Satan. Thousands are nightly attending their meetings.

Immediate and Absolute Prohibition. AMHERST, Sept. 28. Rev. Dr. Luthern preached a powerful centennial temperance sermon here yesterday, during which he insisted upon immediate and absolute prohibition.

Extensive Boycotting. CORK, Sept. 28. The magistrates of this city have called upon the Government to repress the extensive boycotting now existing.

Hanoverian to be Raised. HALIFAX, Sept. 28. It is believed the wrecked steamer Hanoverian, which sank at Trepassy, N. F., will be raised.

FIFTY-FOUR THOUSAND FEET RESERVED FOR CANADA.

FIRST ROYAL EXHIBITION COMMISSION SINCE 1862.
