Production Boom

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was running at the rate of about 14 per cent in the first five months of 1951, "the figures for June and July reflect a curtailment of this trend," the review said. The rate of increase dropped to only seven per cent. Significant, said the Review, was the fact that consumer spending had declined, the rate of increase of bank credit since the budget had slackened and production of durable goods had been reduced. "In the last few months," added the Review, "the output of such consumer's goods as automobiles, electric refrigerators and washing machines have suffered severe setbacks." Industrial employment increased from seven per cent in January to 10 per cent in May, then slackened off to an increase of 8.6 per cent in June and only 7.4 per cent in July.

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coast to act as a coastal co-ordination rescue service. The resolution was sponsored by the West Publico Board. From Charlottetown Five resolutions were submitted by the Charlottetown Board of Trade. One resolved that further request be made to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics to have statistics now issued as a Maritime group be broken down into provincial figures for the four Atlantic Provinces. Another requested the four governments be petitioned to establish uniform trucking regulations. The third viewed with alarm any question of Federal Government control over highways. "We feel strongly that control of highways within a province should be the sole right of each individual province." The other called for a larger boat for the Wood Islands-Caribou ferry service and a request to the Air Transport Board that consideration be given to the establishment of an air service between Prince Edward Island and the west coast of Newfoundland.

Magistrate's Court At Summerside —Yesterday in Summerside before Magistrate R. S. Hinton, K. C., a party from Alberton pleaded guilty to operating a motor vehicle while his ability to drive was impaired by alcohol. He was sentenced to a fine and costs amounting to \$101.85. A Queen's County man charged with operating a motor vehicle without a licence was fined \$5 and costs. A man from Emerald was fined \$20 and costs for being intoxicated in a public place. On Tuesday a Cape Traverse party charged with possession under the Temperance Act was released from jail on \$200 bail and his case was adjourned for hearing. An airman charged with being intoxicated pleaded not guilty and after two witnesses for the prosecution were heard his case was adjourned for a week. An Alberton man was fined \$20 and costs for consuming and two persons from Tignish were given similar fines for being intoxicated. An O'Leary man was fined \$25 and costs for possession. A possession case against a Summerside man was adjourned for a week. Most of the day was taken up with hearing evidence in the case of a navy man, formerly from Summerside, charged with stealing \$18 from a car at Miscouche. The case now stands adjourned for a week. The case of a person from Pleasant View charged with possession of a still was also adjourned, and a local man was fined \$5 and costs for operating a motor vehicle without a licence.—S.

Laymen's Ass'n Monthly Meeting

The Laymen's Association of St. John's Church, St. Eleanor's, and St. Mary's Church, Summerside, held their monthly meeting Tuesday evening in St. Mary's Parish Hall. The president, Mr. J. F. Murphy, presided. There were present representatives of the executive of the Provincial Laymen's Association from Charlottetown and other points.

The meeting opened with prayer by Ven. Archdeacon G. R. Harrison and the singing of the hymn, "Rise Up, O Men of God." Mr. George Whitehead, president of St. Paul's Association, spoke at some length outlining the objects of the organization and giving some helpful suggestions. Dr. E. E. Parkman reported on the special fund collection being made in St. Mary's and St. John's Churches and said the amount raised was now over \$200 which was very encouraging and it was hoped to have this more than doubled when the next quarterly report would be announced.

Major T. E. MacNutt, of Charlottetown, in a brief address emphasized that the strengthening and building up of the church should be the main object of the Laymen's Association. Ven. Archdeacon Harrison congratulated the laymen of St. Eleanor's, also the women, upon the magnificent job done by them in improving their church property. This improvement was so evident as to receive recognition from the Provincial Rural Beautification committee who granted a prize of \$50 to the church.

After some further discussion, a luncheon was served and the meeting adjourned with prayer and benediction by Archdeacon Harrison. —S

Farm Income Figures For 1951 Revealed

OTTAWA, Oct. 3 — (CP) — Canadian farmers reaped a record \$1,245,706,000 in cash during the first six months of 1951, the Bureau of Statistics reported today. But while their cash income jumped, so did the cost of living. During that half-year period the cost-of-living index rose 11.6 points to 184.1 from 172.5. The index, based on 1933-39, equalling 100, now is at a record 183.9. Part of the income climb resulted from a special \$63,000,000 Federal payment to Canadian wheat farmers to clean up a controversial four-year Anglo-Canadian wheat deal.

The half-year cash income was \$38,581,000 higher than the \$887,119,000 in the first six months of 1950 and a jump of \$160,200,000 from the previous high of \$1,085,500,000 in 1949. Besides final wheat-pool payments, factors which attributed to the record were heavier marketings of grain and all-time high prices for Canadian livestock. In addition, Federal aid to drought-stricken farmers totalled \$9,300,000, down from last year's \$13,500,000 but slightly higher than the \$9,200,000 paid in 1949. All provinces, with the exception of Newfoundland which was not included in the report, shared in the higher cash income. Ontario led with \$392,926,000, up from \$333,444,000 in 1950, but the biggest climbs were on the Prairies. Cash income to farmers in Saskatchewan jumped to \$248,627,000 from \$112,294,000; in Manitoba to \$108,633,000 from \$52,574,000; and in Alberta to \$203,978,000 from \$137,423,000.

Other provincial estimates with the corresponding six — months totals in 1950 in brackets: British Columbia, \$42,049,000 (\$37,227,000); Prince Edward Island, \$13,084,000 (\$11,798,000); Nova Scotia, \$22,186,000 (\$17,987,000); New Brunswick, \$22,192,000 (\$20,945,000); Quebec, \$192,018,000 (\$163,319,000). Livestock sales increased to \$494,900,000 from \$403,400,000. From the sale of grains, seeds and hay, along with payments by the Canadian wheat board, farmers received \$361,200,000, almost triple the \$129,800,000 received last year. Other income included \$186,200,000 for dairy products — up 8.6 per cent from \$154,920,000 in 1950, and \$62,700,000 for eggs, up from \$50,700,000.

Income from the sale of vegetables and some field crops, however, declined to \$66,891,000 from \$70,256,000.

The association, which at present comprises the merchants from Richmond to Tignish, has had several carloads of goods come which resulted in savings. The executive also has held a number of meetings.

The secretary, Mr. Moran, in his minutes reported that last year there were 34 members, now there are 47, an increase of 13. Discussion ensued about the possibility of having a man employed to contact the different merchants about purchasing, to act as a purchasing agent.

The Retail Merchants Association decided to meet in two weeks time at Summerside in a special meeting at which the merchants of Summerside and East Prince will be asked to attend. At 7 p. m. the members and their wives attended a sumptuous banquet in the O'Leary Legion Hall, served by the Women's Institute. After the banquet short addresses were made by Harry McFarlane of Summerside, Lloyd McLeod of Charlottetown and Rev. W. G. Dickson of O'Leary. The president, Mr. MacCaull, presided at the banquet. After the singing of the National Anthem the directors held a meeting.

By a standing vote the Merchants Association moved that they were in favor and willing to start a wholesale firm and that the incoming directors will be held responsible for organizing this wholesale firm at the earliest opportunity. The following are the officers: President, Peter N. MacCaull, Ellerslie, re-elected; secretary, J. J. Moran, Alberton, re-elected; 1st vice president, Claude McNeil, O'Leary; 2nd vice president, Hedley Palmer, Roseville; 3rd vice president, H. A. Jelly, O'Leary. The directors are: Jack Foley, Bloomfield and Harold Phillips, Conway.
