Air Force Cadets Commended At Inspection For Hard Work

Group Captain W. H. Swetman, D.S.O., D.F.C., C.D., Commanding Officer of R.C.A.F. Station Summerside told the Charlottetown Air Cadets yesterday that their fine showing on the parade square indicated the vigorous training they had undergone during the past season.

Swetman was inspecting Officer at the annual inspection of No. 60 (Charlottetown) Squadron, Royal Canadian Air Cadets, which was conducted yesterday afternoon at the Charlottetown Airport. He was accompanied by the Air Cadet Liaison Officer, S-L Pellan and his staff.

The Charlottetown Squadron, which also includes a number of boys from rural points, is commanded by S-L Sinclair MacLeod; FSO N.N. Larabee is Adjutant.

The Air Cadet League was first formed in this area in 1941. Until 1950 it was sponsored locally by the Charlottetown Rotary Club. At that time responsibility for the

cadets was taken over by No. 201 (Confederation) Wing Royal Canadian Air Force Association, of which J. M. Larabee is the 1957 president.

Among several awards presented at yesterday's Air Cadet inspection was a special presentation to W-O K. Costain, Charlottetown, for "outstanding contribution to the Squadron". W-O Costain has qualified for a trip to England this year in connection with the

Air Cadet exchange visits now operating between various NATO members.

For the third consecutive year the Charlottetown Air Cadet Squadron was presented with the award for top marksmanship in the Cape Breton and P.E.I. area. These shooting competitions are fired with the small-bore rifle and are open to all Air Cadet Corps in this section.

All presentations were made on behalf of No. 201 Wing by Jack Meredith, who is Chairman of the Wing's Air Cadet Committee.

The inspecting officer, accompanying officials, Squadron Officers and members of the Committee in charge were all well pleased with the number of parents who showed up at the Airport to witness the annual inspection of the squadron.

Following the completion of the field inspection, the inspection team looked over the Squadron stores which are located at West Kent School. In the evening a reception for the inspection officer and his staff was held at the Wing Clubroom on Grafton Street.

At present there are two Air Cadet Squadrons in the Province—one in Charlottetown, the other in Summerside. A third group is now being organized at Tignish.

Moslem Villagers In Flight After 302 Men, Youths Die

ALGIERS (Reuters) — Thousands of Moslem villagers Thursday trekked north through the desert, away from their homes in eastern Algeria's Moulouza area where 302 Moslem men and youths were massacred last week. Men, women and children carried what possessions they could and drove their flocks before them. About 5,000 inhabitants deserted two villages Wednesday and more left a third community in the same area Thursday morning.

French sources, the Algerian National Movement (MNA) and survivors say the massacre was the work of rebels led by the National Liberation Front (FLN). The FLN has issued statements implying the men were killed by the French.

The MNA and FLN are rival organizations, each claiming partial control of the Algerian insurrection against French rule. The nationalist guerilla was trying down some 400,000 French troops in the North African region.

Delegates of the groups now abandoning the villages have asked French authorities for weapons to fight FLN bands, French reports say.

In Algiers, European ex-servicemen and students mingled with North Africans at the funeral of a Moslem victim of a string of bomb attacks Monday. Ten persons were killed and 100 wounded in the new outbreak of terror.

Meanwhile, the wave of violence among North Africans living in France continued. One North African was found shot to death and another with stab wounds in Paris streets Wednesday night. The violence is believed to be the result of rivalry

between FLN and MNA supporters for reprisals against pro-French North Africans.

Paris police arrested 126 Algerians and seized arms, money and pamphlets in a dawn raid on North African quarters of the city. An interior ministry statement said the men arrested are "particularly dangerous individuals" who acted as "propaganda agents, fund collectors and members of shock groups entrusted with terrorist acts" during recent weeks.
