ON Wednesday morning a lady of this city was startled while engaged in the important duty of looking after the fire to find her clothing in a flame. But she didn't shriek and rush into the frosty air. Not she. She simply drew her skirts together and quenched it before it had time to do serious damage.

MARTIN DOYLE and Archibald McGahy were summoned before Theo. DesBrisay, Esq., to-day, at the instance of Mr. Duncan McDonald, of Tryon Road. While Mr. McDonald was proceeding homewards, on New Year's Eve, with his family, he was waylaid on the Tryon Road by the two men above named. They were full of the "ardent," and, without the least provocation, violently assaulted McDonald, his wife and son. The parties appeared for trial to-day, but the case was withdrawn by mutual consent—defendants paying all costs.

In the last issue of the Summerside Progress there appeared an article which cast grave doubts upon the constitutionality of the Canada Temperance Act. The article drew from the Rev. N. McKay a prompt reply, which appears in yesterday's Journal. The reverend gentleman says: "The question of competency is, itself, a fair one, and it must, of course, come up in due time. But it is startling to find a newspaper gravely assuming that the Act is *ultra vires*, because somebody has said so, setting it aside as so much waste paper, and asking what is the use of bothering the people about it. The raising of a question is, by no means, the settling of it, and this distinction seems, in the remarks referred to, to be overlooked. Considering the general character of the promoters of the liquor traffic, it is to be expected that every kind of objection will be raised against the Act. Its operation will be fiercely contested at every point. It would be ridiculous to accept every point raised as necessarily valid. If the friends of the bill are to be frightened by every bugbear presented to them in the name of the Constitution, they may as well give up the contest. They are not made of that sort of material. If constitutional difficulties should arise under the operation of the act they will meet them when they come. If further legislation, on the part either of the Dominion or local Parliament, should be found necessary they will obtain it. Of one thing there can be no doubt. The people of this county have emphatically and nobly declared their determination to stop the liquor traffic among them. The people of other counties are only awaiting the opportunity to declare themselves to the same effect. This tide of public feeling and resolution will make itself felt in all our legislative assemblies, and secure such legislation, if we have it not already, as will effectually sweep this evil from the face of our fair country. The liquor traffic will die hard; but it will die all the same."

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Serious Situation in France.

Revolution Feared.

The Governor General and Princess to Visit Niagara Falls.

LONDON, Jan. 16.
 All special correspondents of the London newspapers speak of the situation in France as serious.
 The *Times*' Paris despatch, though subsequently qualifying the information by a statement that the meeting of the Republican Union was reported more moderate in character, declares that the Left appears almost determined to overthrow the Dufaure Cabinet, as it is unworthy of confidence unless it publishes beforehand a list of the intended dismissal of functionaries. The Cabinet refuses thus to compromise its dignity.
 The conduct of the Republicans is justifying all the worst predictions of their adversaries.

LONDON, Jan. 16.
 The Paris correspondent of the "Times" regards the situation as very critical. The overthrow of the Cabinet, he says, would lead to McMahon's retirement and the government by the Extreme Left, with a revolutionary programme, which would profoundly derange society throughout France. The Ministerial Declaration was read in the Chamber of Deputies this afternoon. It says the Senatorial Elections are a striking indication of the adhesion of the people to Republican institutions.

SUPREME COURT.

JAN. 17, 1879.
 MR. JUSTICE PETERS presiding. Mr. Justice Hensley, also, for a short time took his seat upon the Bench.

Crockett vs. Lowe.—The defence in this case is that Lowe secured the services of the plaintiff for P. W. Hyndman, Esq., and it was agreed that Mr. Hyndman should pay the defendant. It was shown, in evidence, that the defendant himself was hired by the day.
 At 3.30 p. m. the jury on this case retired.

MR. JUSTICE HENSLEY presiding.
The case of the Queen at the prosecution of Alex. McKinlay vs. Donald McKinnon for larceny.—The Attorney-General opened the case for the Crown. He said that, on the 28th day of December, Mr. McKinlay, the prosecutor in the case, missed the hay which had been stolen from his barn. Over the hay stolen was a lot of unthreshed oats, a large quantity of the grains of which shook down among the hay. When the load was made and the sleigh moved along the road, the oat grains shook out and left a trace as they went along. Mr. McKinlay followed the trace so made to the house of Mr. Jacob Cummings, where he discovered the hay and a clue to the parties who stole it.
 Mr. McKinlay and the Sheriff were the only two witnesses examined. The former related the circumstances of the larceny and the latter testified that the prisoner—while on examination during the trial of Charles Horriell for the same larceny—confessed to stealing the hay in company with Horriell from the barn of Mr. McKinlay.
 After the Attorney General and Judge Hensley had plainly and briefly stated the facts of the case the jury returned a verdict of "guilty" without leaving the panel.
 The Grand Jury found True Bills against James Crosby for stealing four sheep from Mr. Alex. McKinlay, and against James Crosby and Benj. Dockendorff for the larceny of goods from sleighs at the "Seven Mile House." Prisoners pleaded not guilty.
The Queen at the prosecution of A. A. Baldwin vs. O'Reilly and Troy—Larceny. Trial to-morrow.
