

### Nationalists Are Silent On Red Cease Fire Offer

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—Red China today announced a seven-day halt in its bombardment of the offshore islands in the Formosa Strait to permit supplies to be landed if they are not escorted by Americans.

A spokesman for the U.S. command on Formosa said any decision to halt U.S. escorts of Nationalist vessels and supply planes must come from Washington.

There was no order to halt escorts up until 5 a.m. today and it was presumed any escort missions already planned will take place unless Washington cancels them.

Nationalist officials declined to comment on the cease-fire offer and an offer for direct Communist-Nationalist Chinese peace talks until they have seen an official text of the statement by Peng Teh-hual, Red China's defence minister.

### Says Stories On Douks Inaccurate

VANCOUVER (CP)—A Douk-hobor editor accused the press of British Columbia of "inaccuracy, prejudice and discrimination" in handling news about Douk-hobors and the Sons of Freedom sect.

Koozma J. Tarasoff, editor of The Inquirer, a Saskatoon paper published by Douk-hobors, made the charges in a written statement, extracts from which were published Saturday by the Vancouver Sun. He said they were based on a two-month study of 800 clippings taken from 34 B.C. newspapers in the last four years.

Mr. Tarasoff accused the press of making irresponsible statements by implying that terrorism in the Kootenays and the Okanagan should be blamed on the Douk-hobors or Sons of Freedom. Mr. Tarasoff said no terrorism charge had ever been proved against a Douk-hobor or Son of Freedom.

A doctor said the boy was exhausted but cheerful and tried to crack jokes through his puffed lips.

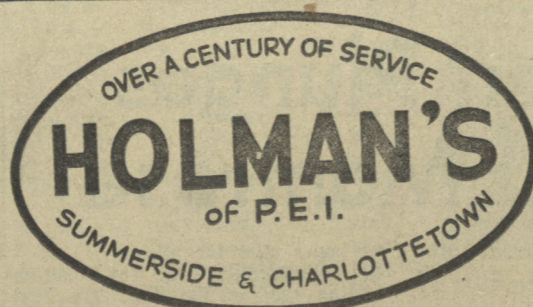
a bar. Fitzpatrick, 28, said he mentioned his 1956 stunt and that his unidentified co-drinker didn't believe him.
