

MR. CARTWRIGHT'S POLITICAL MORALITY!

OUR readers will remember that Dr. Tupper successfully met Mr. Cartwright's attack upon the Liberal-Conservative Opposition by quoting from Mr. Cartwright's "Prospectus." When asked to explain how he came to tell the capitalists of England one story, and the people of Canada another, Mr. Cartwright had the audacity to excuse himself as follows (vide his speech at Aylmer.) He said: "His opponents had complained of the prospectus issued by him in 1875, when contracting his second loan. He (Mr. Cartwright) still adhered to every word in it as well as to the charge of extravagance against Sir John. At that time he [Mr. Cartwright] had to show how grossly the resources of Canada had been squandered. When he went to England it was not a part of his duty to cry 'stinking fish.' He showed to Englishmen that Canada's progress had been great and marked. Speaking to Canadians he might, perhaps, shew the brazen side of the shield, but to the English he desired to show the silver side."

Referring to this novel excuse, the Halifax Reporter says:—

"There's high-toned morality for you. Blacken Canada to Canadians; brighten Canada for Englishmen. Say white is black on one side of the Atlantic and black is white on the other side; it's all right in Mr. Cartwright's eyes—humbly the people of Canada—humbly the people of England by telling two different stories at one and the same time. 'It's all right,' says Richard John. 'It's all right,' says the moral Premier. 'It's all right,' shout the standard elevators, one and all. But the common sense of the people does not consider all right. It's far from being 'all right.' It's all wrong. It's deception. It's deluding. It's a false pretence—a sham—a piece of hypocrisy worthy of the 'organized hypocrisy' which rule and ruin the country. Strange to say Mr. Cartwright does not seem to see there is anything in telling the people of Canada that the shield is only bronze, and the people of England that it is pure, genuine silver. He boasts of his exploit as something creditable to his genius. More shame to him and his coadjutors, who have become so used to the embrace of corruption that they think the foul form the acme of beauty, the personification of purity. How is the gold become dim!"

A REFORMATORY WANTED.

YESTERDAY morning, a boy about thirteen years of age was arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate for stealing \$20. The evidence produced was clear, and he was convicted and sentenced to six months' imprisonment with hard labor. There are now in jail, in this city, six boys and two girls, none of whom are over fourteen years of age, undergoing imprisonment for larceny. The want of a Reformatory in this city is every day becoming more apparent.

FATAL RAILWAY ACCIDENT.—At St. Thomas, on the Intercolonial Railway, on Thursday, a terrible accident occurred. The express train ran over and crushed a young girl on the bridge over the River du Sud. The name of the unfortunate girl is Menon De Courberon.

Higgins, a boy of respectable appearance, about 13 years of age, was sentenced to six months' hard labor. Heavy Crops.

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN MANITOBA.

Special Dispatch to Daily Examiner.

MONTREAL, Sept. 28. Crop reports from all parts of Ontario and Quebec, just received, say the crops are the heaviest in ten years. The Governor General leaves Winnipeg for Ottawa to-morrow. His visit to Manitoba was a great success. Flour dull; buyers holding off and freight advancing. Prices unchanged.

WAR NEWS.

LONDON, Sept. 27. A Russian official despatch from Gorny Stufen says, on the 22nd, about 10,000 Turkish infantry from Sofia, supported by artillery, forced their way through our cavalry posted to intercept them, and entered Plezna. Further details are wanting. All quiet around Rutchuk and the Balkans. It is reported that the peace party are gaining the upper hand in Serbia. The News' correspondent at Segalino telegraphs: "The discontent and discouragement are greater in the Russian army even than I expected. I have not spoken with a single officer who does not regard success as hopeless."

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 27. Private telegrams state that the Russian centre attacked Plezna yesterday and were repulsed yesterday with a loss of seven thousand men and four guns. The report is probably unfounded as no official confirmation has been received. BUCHAREST, Sept. 27. Gen. Skobeloff and Todleben left here to-day for the army. LONDON, Sept. 27. It is stated that Germany will renew her remonstrances to the Porte against breaches of the Geneva Convention in a more pointed manner. Goransko has surrendered to the Montenegrins. VIENNA, Sept. 27. The newspapers have announced that in consequence of the large concentration of Russian troops, and the difficulty of obtaining supplies on account of bad weather, Mehmet Ali, on the 24th inst., commenced retreating to his former positions on the Kara Lom. BERTIN, Sept. 27. At Goransko the Montenegrins took 300 regular prisoners and captured three cannon and 500 rifles. The Montenegrins have also occupied Piva, captured Fort Coek-vica, and now hold the whole territory as far as Fotsch. They have totally burned Bilick and surrounding villages, after sending the sick and wounded and non-combatants to Trebinge.

GENERAL NEWS.

LONDON, Sept. 27. The jury in the Penge case found all the four prisoners, namely Louis Staunton, Patrick Staunton, Patrick's wife and Alice Rhodes, guilty of murder by starving to death the wife of Louis Staunton. The two women were recommended to mercy. The judge passed sentence of death on all. VIENNA, Sept. 27. In the Reichstag the President of the Council declared the Government maintained a policy of perfect neutrality. Regarding a contingency of Servia's participation in the war he said the Government could not declare its policy in anticipation of that event. LONDON, Sept. 27. The India Office invites tenders for a loan of £3,000,000, payable in seven years, bearing interest at four per cent. Lord Derby has received a telegram from Minister Layard, stating that he is using his best efforts in behalf of the Geshoffs, but that their case is serious. Derby adds: "I have taken measures to inform the Porte of the strong sympathy felt for the Geshoffs in England; and trust these representations will not be ineffectual, although I have no means of judging how far the Geshoffs may have been implicated in the designs against the Porte." Bullion in the Bank of England decreased £143,070 during the week. The specie in the Bank of France increased 2,600,000 francs. The London Times, in its financial article, says Purvis & Co., and Gyselman & Van Rinkuyen, of Batavia, failed, owing to speculative operations in sugar. Their liabilities are understood to be large; all chiefly in America.

CRICKET MATCH.—A match will be played to-day in Victoria Park between the married and single members of the Club—wickets to be pitched at 2 o'clock sharp. Mr. Albert Hensley and Rev. Mr. Stewart will represent the foreign element on each side. As one match this season has been won by the married and one by the single gentlemen, a very close and exciting game is expected. As this is likely to be the closing match of the season, we hope to see a large assemblage of spectators to witness this most English of all English games.
