Eisenhower Hears British Defence Plans

LONDON, Jan. 17 — (CP) — Britain's top defence planners have told Gen. Dwight Eisenhower they hope that before the year's end he will have behind him a Britain stronger than ever before in peacetime.

- 1. Britain's arms bill during the next three years will be boosted from £3,000,000,000 to nearly £4,000,000,000 (\$15,000,000,000);
- 2. Armament orders amounting to £450,000,000 already have been placed, and industry is being geared to a near-wartime production effort;
- 3. Some 500,000 workers are engaged in arms production and by the end of March this figure will be up to 750,000;
- 4. A scheme is on paper for an experimental call-up of more than 100,000 veterans of the Second World War for three months' training;
- 5. Production of tanks and planes will be doubled and four new army divisions organized in the next year or so;
- 6. Britain will probably station four army divisions instead of three in Germany under the Atlantic Pact organization; and
- 7. The Commonwealth countries have agreed on a rough blueprint for the defence of the Middle East, which, with the Eastern Mediterranean, will be linked to Eisenhower's Atlantic Pact command areas.

Calls For Greatly Expanded Defense Effort In Canada

TORONTO, Jan. 17 — (CP) — Rhys M. Sale, president of the Ford Motor Company of Canada Limited, today called for a greatly expanded Canadian defence effort and for a crack-down on Communists.

"We have the wherewithal for a defence effort 10 times greater than the puny program now in effect without seriously crippling the nation's ability to provide a decent standard of living," he said in an address to the Canadian Club. "We may have to go without some of the luxuries we enjoy today, but we can afford to do without them if the security of our homes, families and institutions is at stake.

"The price of national security—however high it may be—is worth paying. The price of insecurity might be slavery."

He said Canada has the soundest economy of any nation. "We have vast natural resources. We have an industrial plant that can be geared to at least twice the output attained at the peak of the Second World War. We have 2,000,000 more people than we had in 1939."

Mr. Sale urged that Canadians start thinking and planning and acting as if they had certain knowledge that Canada would be up against a war deadline six months from today.

This included placing armed forces on a full war footing, stepping up reserve force training, suspending enlargement of welfare schemes, speeding defence production, harnessing factories to stockpile vital materials, training skilled workers, preparing tax policies and stamping out Communism.

Australia and South Africa had outlawed the Communist party, broken up Communist organizations and put a severe crimp in subversive activity. Canadians could bar Communists from public office, union executives, defence plants, ban their public meetings, close down their newspapers and padlock their assembly halls.

Mr. Sale said such steps might drive the Communists underground, but "I have the utmost confidence in the ability of the R.C.M.P. and our provincial and municipal police to dig them from their hiding places when the time comes to put them in concentration camps."
