#### Notes and Comments.

Some of Mr. Brastus Wimsu's creditors are said to be willing to take ten cents on the dollar for their claims against his estate. Broke down a hard pan there has been very little more in the Reciprocity prophet's financial schemes than there was in his political plans.

Mr. Courdet, one of the United States counsel before the Behring Sea arbitration, has arrived home, and says in an interview that when the discussion shall have been closed the responsibility will rest upon the tribunal, and as that tribunal is composed of eminent and honorable jurists of different nationalities, we may reasonably expect a decision that will be satisfactory to the enlightened public opinion of the world. The bearing of this opinion on the great issue would seem, as the Montreal Gazette remarks, to be in the application of it.

The United States demanded and obtained a large sum of money in the Alabama award which was not justly due. It tried to repudiate the Halifax fishery award, by which payment of Canada's claims for fishing privileges was ordered. It threatens at Paris to back out of the arbitration, against all the laws of international honor, if the judgment should be unfavorable. And now it transpires that the great Republic has been for some time trying to evade payment of extradition fees under the distinct agreement and pledge made in the Extradition Treaty with Great Britain, by which the country applying for extradition pays the costs.

Cholera succeeds in obtaining entrance to American ports it is likely to come by way of the Mediterranean. It is significant that Narbonne, Certe and other places in which disease of a choleraic nature is said to have shown itself, are either situated upon or have water communication with the Mediterranean. Certe, for instance, is the principal commercial port, next to Marseilles, in the south of France, and has a considerable trade with the Levant. Indeed, all the ports on the Mediterranean shore of France have more or less traffic with Asiatic Turkey, in the Arabian portion of which cholera is now raging, despoiling from sixty to seventy lives every day in Mecca alone. But in addition to the peril of cholera being imported to European ports by the Mediterranean from Western Asia, it is very probable that cholera is indigenous in France; that is, the pestilence was brought to France many years ago and that the germs are there already and need only certain conditions to develop them. French reports speak of a "disease of a choleraic nature" being the cause of death, when the cause of death is probably genuine Asiatic cholera, either lurking in the locality or recently brought from abroad.

The Empire remarks: The leading opposition organ in Toronto does not like Mr. Van Horne's statement made in Winnipeg that by unrestricted reciprocity "the whole inside of Manitoba would be jerked out," and it takes considerable space in which to vent this feeling of indignation. Yet the average Canadian will realize that the able President of the Canadian Pacific generally knows what he is talking about, and probably does in the present instance. As a shrewd business man, Mr. Van Horne would never dream of increasing the railway's mileage and affording almost daily new and costly facilities to the public if he had not confidence in the policy of the country and in its future. If, therefore, he deliberately declares that the grip scheme would destroy the interests of the Northwest, which is doing everything possible to build up, it is likely that the Canadian people will be more inclined to believe the man who knows and appreciates that section of our great Dominion rather than the Globe, which, for fifteen years, has belittled and ridiculed the Territories and British Columbia; which has bitterly opposed the great railway which has made the country what it is, and which now endeavors, as a last resource, to breed dissension between the officials of the railway and the people to whom it has been such a boon.

#### A Novel Temperance Law.

[Boston Herald]  
The attempts at legislation for the cure of drunkenness are unending, and many of them are ingenious. In Massachusetts they range from the fifteen gallon law of 1839 to the proposition for the Norwegian system of the present year. The legislators drive it out by denying everybody liquor, in order that the drunkard may be included, was the crudest form of all, and is in effect abandoned. We have fallen back upon license with local option, as the best thing attainable, and the western states are disposed to follow us. Those states who do not—West or East—are simply living under law notoriously not enforced. They have a law in Michigan which strikes us as altogether bad. It provides that when a man is convicted of drunkenness he may have his choice between being sent to jail and being committed to an asylum for the cure of drunkenness. The state will pay for his treatment if he elects the latter. Its intention is excellent, but it assumes drunkenness to be a disease, as it probably is in many cases. Whether the state can practically undertake to cure a disease so widespread with beneficial results will probably be doubted by many. It would be hazardous to furnish a certificate of "discharged cured" in almost any case.

### Farmers and Canadian Progress.

(The Empire.)  
No single branch of Canadian development is so marked as the export of farm products to Great Britain. That vast rearing market seems, and is, capable of absorbing more and more our produce for many decades. It has largely compensated for any loss following that embodiment of American hostility to Canada and Grit treachery to its then interests—the McKinley Bill—and promises in the future to prove still more clearly how foolish a portion of our people have been in being ready to throw away everything else in pursuit of that Will of the Wisp, the sixty millions market, as if we were hopelessly dependent upon it.

The trade returns are a revelation in this respect, and we commend the figures to all who have not been able to investigate the seemingly dry tables for themselves. When, however, the cash realized from the following sales of produce to England was turned into the hands of the farmers of Canada, it is safe to say that the result was not as uninteresting as the mere figures may seem to be in a trade and navigation blue book:

In 1878, under that miserable system—a revenue tariff—we actually imported from the United States \$6,510,000 worth of wheat and nearly \$2,000,000 worth of flour. And of the products mentioned above, our farmers only sent \$4,846,000 worth to Great Britain, or thirty millions less than the present export. Yet they are being urged to go back to a system of external agricultural competition in their own market, and consequent restriction of home production. In 1878 the cattle trade was only beginning; the cheese trade was in its infancy, and that in apples was non-existent. Stopped up, the progress of the Canadian farmer is something of which we may be proud instead of despondent and pessimistic. And it is not improbable that ten years will see as great a development in our exports of barley, eggs, horses, hay, wheat and apples to Great Britain as the past decade has witnessed in cheese, cattle and wheat.

#### One of Whittier's Last Poems.

The three-page poem, by John G. Whittier, which appeared in the November Number of the *Nicholas Magazine*, commemorates the visit of a party of young girls to the poet's home. It contains the following lines, which have a peculiar significance now that the good Quaker poet has passed away:

"I would not if I could repeat  
A life which still is good and sweet;  
I keep in age, as in my prime,  
A not unceasing sleep of time,  
And, grateful for all blessings sent,  
I go the common way content  
To make no new experiment,  
On easy terms with law and fate,  
For what must be I calmly wait,  
And trust the path I cannot see,  
That God is good enough me.  
And when at last upon life's play  
The curtain falls, I only pray  
That hope may lose itself in truth,  
And age in Heaven's immortal youth,  
And all our loves and longings prove  
The fortales of diviner love!"

LONDON, June 15.—James Gilbert, the dynamiter, recently released from Portland Prison, because he was thought to be near death, sailed on the American steamship *Chester* from Southampton Saturday. Three physicians certified that the voyage would probably prolong his life. In an interview Monday, Gilbert said that he intended during his sojourn in the United States to direct the Washington Government's attention to the pitiable condition of Americans imprisoned at Portland. Gallagher, he said, had become hopelessly insane and Daly was dying slowly. Other political prisoners were released with insanity. He himself had passed six months in the prison hospital during the year immediately preceding his release.
